Proceedings of the Morning Session at the First M. E. Church.

A Number of Candidates Elected to Deacon's Office and Addressed.

The North Nebraska annual conference of the Methodist church held a session yesterday at the First M. E. church, beginning at 9 a. m., Bishop Isaac W. Wiley presiding.

J. M. Adair, superannuated, was reported for the effective relief, and on recommendation of Rev. Maxwell was made financial agent of the Nebraska Wesleyan university.

The third question was taken up, "Who shall remain on trial?" Elijah C. Boaz and Clinton C. Day were reported. On motion of J. L. McClair, Rev. Boaz was received on his credentials.

The thirteenth question, "Who are deacons of the first class?" was taken up. E. G. Fowler was elected to elder's orders. Riley B. Wilson was reported by his presiding elder, and advanced to be a deacon of the second class, conditioned on intellectual service.

The following gentlemen were introduced from the Swedish conference: J. A. Galbreath, presiding elder of the Kansas and Nebraska district, and N. W. Sunderson. There were also introduced Dr. Miller, of the Nebraska conference, Rev. Gortner and Dr. McCandlish.

James R. Gearhardt was reported by his presiding elder and advanced to be a deacon of the second class. C. F. Heywood was passed to the fourth year and to be a deacon of the second class.

Joel A. Smith's character was passed and collection reported by Supt. T. B. Lemon. He was received as an effective elder.
