WAS IT PREMATURE?

A large number of the railroad organs wearing the republican label and several journals who have classed themselves as friendly to the Anti-Monopoly cause are clamoring for the endorsement of Judge Savage by the Grand Island convention.

New no one knows better than these gentlemen that the nomination of a candidate unendorsed by either of the two dominant parties, would have been a senseless waste of ammunition on the part of the Anti-Monopoly convention.
