

RELIGIOUS. Six new Protestant chapels were opened in France in one week

A Christian Policeman's Association ha The first convocation of the colored clergy of the Protestant Episcopal Church will held at St. Philip's Church, in New York city September 12, 13, and 14.

The Methodist ministers of New England receive an average salary of \$560 a year, the Baptists a trifle more, the Presbyterians \$740,

the recently published returns of the Primitive Methodst connexional chapels shows that the denomination has 4,200 chapels, the value of which is \$14,038,625. These chapels previde accommodation for nearly 900,000 hearers, with an average attendance on the Sabbath of 585,414. The income during the past year has amounted to over \$1,270,000. It appears by recently published Episcopal It appears by recently published Episcopal diocesan statistics that New Jersey's 91 rectors are supplemented in their labors by 41 lay readers, Massachusetts' 168 clergy by 46 lay readers and helpers, while in Kentucky and Alabama they number almost as many as the regular clergy, there being in the former State only 37 clergymen to 25 lay readers, and in Alabama 27 to 19 lay readers.

On Oct 3 the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church holds its centannial meeting in Christ church, Philadelphia, the ame edifice in which, a hundred years ago, the first convention of that church ratified the Book of Common Prayer. At the first meeting but two bishops were presents. There are now sixty, in whose diocese there are now upwards of 3,000 churches, 3,500 clergymen, and nearly 350,000 communi-

From the comparative Presbyterian church in the United States, just issued under the authority of the ceneral as-sembly, it appears that the total number of communicants in 1883 is 600,725, an increase of 8,597 as compared with 1882, and the total number of churches 5,860, an increase of 116 as compared with 1882. Since the last summary was is-ued 10,397 adults and 17,728 infants have been baptized. The total ministers is 5,218, not including licentistics of the test. is 5,218, not including licentiates of the past year, 182; and caudidates, 678.
