A Movement Started to Wipe Out the H, phenated Title of the Denomination.

The Liberate 1 Baptists Gather In Delegate Convention at Minneapolis Other Church Meetings.

PHILADELPHIA, October 4.—The genvention of the Projectant Episcopal church of the United States reassembled this morning. Rev. Dr. Morgan Dix, of New York, presented papers relative to the election of Rev. Dr. H. C. Potter as assistant Bishop of New York, and asked that an early day be fixed for his consideration.
