The victory of the home over the saloon caused quite an increased activity in "the home" market. Six licenses to marry were granted yesterday, and four weddings took place.

RAH FOR THE REPS. They Win the Race on the Cold Water Course. The Entire County Ticket Elected with Perhaps Two Exceptions. The City Vote in Detail.

The statement of the result of the election here as stated in yesterday's BEE was closely verified by the final count, the exact figures being about the same as THE BEE's estimate. In the city the Republicans carry their State ticket by a majority of 129. The First ward went Democratic by 34 votes, the others Republican, the Second giving 122, the Third 40, and the Fourth 1. The following is the vote as given in detail:

George Carson, for State Senator, got a majority of 83 in the city. The majorities in the city of the county officers were: Kirkland 465, Bennett 27, Guittar 333, Matthews 417, Kirkland, Guittar and Matthews carried every ward in the city.

The reports from the county towns show that the county will go several hundred Republican majority.

The election of the whole Republican county ticket is assured, except the supervisors, it being thought that Messrs. Phillips and Clayton are defeated.

The position of Supervisor is one in which it is almost impossible to keep from stepping on somebody's toes and the polls afford a chance for such to get even.

The following towns report Republican majorities: Center 77, Grove 73, Hardin 9, Knox 43, Lewis 4, Silver Creek 39, Valley 64, Washington a dead heat, Wright 77.

The Democratic majorities reported are Boomer 88, Crescent 65, Garner 47, Hazel Dell 1, Keg Creek 59, Layton 17, Minden 58, Neola 29, Norwalk 5, and Rockford 34.

Col. Daily, as chairman of the Republican committee, is entitled to great credit for his methods of work, enterprise and vigilance by day and by night.

Laying of the Corner Stone. By special dispensation the corner stone of the new Masonic Temple will be laid this morning in the southwest corner by Grand Master Geo. B. Van Saun. The address will be delivered by Grand Secretary T. S. Parvin.
