Cheap Railroad Tickets at Bushnell's.

A man named Booth was run in by Officer Barhyte, and brought before the police court yesterday morning.

The cases of Thos. Ball vs. Sarah Ball, for divorce, and Sarah G. Foote vs. Jno. H. Spikler and Evans Wheeler, foreclosure, were filed in the clerk's office Monday.

Justice Abbott yesterday discharged the boys who were accused of stealing and maliciously destroying watermelons in Toster's vegetable garden north of Streetsville.

Repairs of the heating apparatus at the high school are now completed, and the school will again be opened. It is to be hoped that it will not be necessary to close it again for a few weeks.

This morning at half past 9 the application of M. Mason and C. E. Bowen, of Carroll county, for a writ of habeas corpus will be considered by Judge Aylesworth. The case came up yesterday but was continued until today.

The National convention of firemen will convene this year at New Orleans, La. Messrs. matters pertaining to fire duties generally. Chief Temple will attend as a delegate from this city and will start south next Friday evening.

The owner of the property corner of Broadway and Bryant streets, occupied by Mrs. Fleming as a photograph gallery, was ordered to remove the outside stairway, as it was an obstruction and a nuisance.

Jim Snoderly has been before the police court again. He was charged with assault and battery, but was discharged. Jim is an old offender, and it is a pity he cannot be sent over the road on general principles.

Our city council has succeeded in refunding \$18,500 outstanding eight and ten per cent. bonds and placing their stead new 5-20 bonds drawing six per cent. interest. They were sold to one purchaser and brought \$100 above par.

The work of grading and raising the sidewalks on Broadway between Seventh and Eighth streets has been commenced, and will be rapidly pushed to completion. The abutting property owners are making the improvement at their own expense.

Miss Agnes Fenlon, who for a number of years has been a faithful and efficient teacher, has resigned and will return to her home in York township. Miss Jeffries has been appointed to fill the vacancy made by Miss Fenlon's resignation.

One of the resolutions passed by the Common Council Monday evening, instructed the Clerk to prepare a notice returnable to him, and have it served by the Marshal on Mrs. Monroe, ordering her to remove the building owned by her, which was washed out Sixth street by the flood last June. She is to have 15 days in which to remove it, or the city will do it and charge it to the property.

Miss Minnie Smith yesterday filed an application in Justice Schurz' court, asking that a search warrant be issued to search the premises of one Sadie Roberts for one black satin dress and one large size trunk belonging to Miss Minnie Smith. The applicant claims that Sadie Roberts has concealed the above property in her residence, and that the property was stolen from her. The matter will come up for final hearing before Justice Schurz today.

John Barrett was yesterday arrested on a warrant issued by Justice Schurz, he being accused of stealing and taking from Charles Gregory's blacksmith shop an overcoat valued at \$15. The coat belonged to one Joel Hutchins, a farmer living south of the city and was left there while he made some purchases. Barrett in default of \$100 bail was committed to the jail and his case will be investigated today.

The attention of the proper authorities, as well as the public, should be drawn to the trap in front of the new Mynter building. The coal hole in the sidewalk is a dangerous one, only being covered by two small loose boards, which can be kicked off at any time. A fall into the hole might cost the life of some pedestrian. Attention was called to it while passing, by noticing a small child trip and fall while passing near it.

Yesterday forenoon as a Swede named Andrew Jacobson, with his wife and child, in a wagon was driving around the corner of Eighth avenue and Main street, he was run into by an express wagon. The fore wheel of Jacobson's wagon was broken off, and the team so frightened that there would have been a serious runaway had not Col. Town, of Avoca, who happened to be near, caught the horses by the head. A complaint was entered against the expressman for careless driving.

At the monthly meeting of the school board Supt. McNaughton submitted his report, showing that there are 2,053 pupils enrolled in the public schools of the city. That the average attendance is 1,754 and that only 620 were not absent or tardy during the month. This undoubtedly is not a very good showing for the promptness of the pupils who attend our city schools and is proof positive that the parents do not perform their duty in performing their school duties. Our teachers were paid for services during September \$2,569.16. Janitors during the same time, \$286, other bills paid out of the contingent fund amounting to \$722.13.

Shugart, Waite & Wics is the firm name of the new firm that succeeds to

the business of the Shugart Implement company of this place. The firm proposes to increase its facilities for transacting business by the erection of two large buildings two stories high, one to be about 50x135 and the other about 75x120. One of these buildings will really be an addition or enlargement of the one now occupied by the company on lower Main street. The other will be near the C. M. & St. P. R. R. track.

G. T. Jeffries, as the confidence man who was judged Monday afternoon, as recorded in THE BEE, calls himself, lies in jail awaiting his examination, which is set for next Friday. Monday afternoon he was placed under bonds in the amount of \$200. This amount he could not raise, so was committed to jail. Yesterday he was taken before Judge Aylesworth but the examination was postponed until Friday and the amount of the bond raised to \$500. He claims to have a brother in Minneapolis who has been telegraphed for. He says his parents reside in Louisville, Ky. Judge Aylesworth placed the amount of the bond high enough to hold him for examination at least, and it is to be sincerely hoped that if guilty he will go over the road.

Badly mashed was an old man named Frey by the incoming passenger train on the Rock Island road yesterday morning. Frey is a Hessian by birth, his residence in Atlantic, and he was employed on Dailey's construction train. He was at work on the track with his back to the coming train, and did not see it. The engine blew two sharp blasts of the whistle, but as there was a strong wind Frey did not hear it. He was struck by the engine, which by this time had been slowed down to a speed of about ten miles per hour, and his right leg broken just below the knee. His head was also badly bruised, and one eye gouged out. He was brought in on the passenger train and Dr. Pimney attended to him.

THE BEE learns from Mr. Raymond, who has the contract for building the bridge across Indian Creek on Maine and Bryant streets, that the Bryant street bridge will be completed in about two weeks. It is to be a wooden structure with low truss and wooden spans and combination structure. It is 65 feet long and will cost the city \$1,700. The Main street bridge will be completed in about two or three months and ready for use. It will be a high truss and iron structure and of the best material. The length of the entire bridge will be 100 feet and will cost \$4,500. Messrs. Raymond & Campbell, the contractors, are experienced men in the line of bridge building and the people of Council Bluffs may rely upon the work being promptly and properly performed as is every job they undertake.

Baldwin, was appointed to confer with the city council as to the most feasible means of sewerage of the city. Mr. Dohany appeared before the board and stated that the new opera house would soon be completed and asked that the board appoint a special committee to sell tickets for the opening night, in accordance with the proposition made by the business men, that when the opera house was completed they would guarantee the sale of 1000 tickets at five dollars each for the opening night.

The following special committee was appointed: Jno. W. Chapman, Henry Eisenman, Robt. Percival, A. Graham, Dr. J. C. Haven, Dan Eicher, J. W. Perogoy, Thos. Bowman, E. E. Harkness, and J. T. Evans. Five Hundred Dollars Dropped by a Dupe.

BROWN'S BONANZA.

His Grandfather's Gift.

Capt. R. E. Brown, the genial and accommodating general ticket agent, corner of Broadway and Pearl streets, in this city, had a grandfather. Most people have. But Capt. Brown knows who his grandfather was. In 1786, nearly 100 years ago, this grandfather, Thomas Brown, purchased some land in Pennsylvania, laid it out in town lots, and called the place Brownsville, which name it bears even to this day.
