The habit is generally contracted by the young while attending school; older companions through their example, may be responsible for it, or it may be acquired through accident. Cattle Feeding Experiment. Blair Pilot.

· Dick" Blaco has been experimenting in different ways in cattle feeding this summer. Some time ago we published the result of one of his experiments and now we have another to give our readers who are so many of them interested in making good beef and making it quick and cheap. June 24th Mr. B., weighed thirty-five

head of two-year-old steers and turned

them into a forty acre red clover and timothy pasture He fed them lightly with ear corn for the first month after which time he gave them all they would eat. August 25th following-sixty-two days after-he weighed them and found they had gained 192 lbs. each. He continued the same course of feeding until last Monday, the 8th inst. -43 days later -and weighed them again when they part. The ceiling decorations are almost showed a still further gain of 135 lbs. each, or a total for the 106 days of 330 lbs. each. In the pasture with them were 125 to 200 head of hogs, large and small, that Mr. B. says are in a very thriving condition and the larger ones read for market. Mr. B. has taken the steers off from grass now and proposes to force them along as fast as possible until Christmas when he expects to market them. Their average weight now is

for two year olds past. Mr. B. is strong in the belief that the way to realize on beef cattle and make feeding profitable is to stuff them from the start and keep them fat and growing every minute. He thinks the profits of the business is in fatting instead of grow ing cattle and is not quite certain that yearlings properly fed and marketed would not yield more profit than if kept till they were older.

THE NEW STEAMER OREON.

Her Dimensions, Machinery rnd Luxurious Fittings.

New York Sun. The new steamer Oregon which reached this port yesterday has been designed on finer lines and with considerably more incorporation with the secretary of state. horse-power, than even the swift Alaska. The capital stock of the former is \$45, Her length is 520 feet, her breadth 54 000 and of the latter \$10,000. feet and her depth 40 feet 9 inches.
