NEW YORK will still be the pivotal State in the next Presidential election, and that means Chester A. Arthur as the most available candidate on the Republican side of the fence.

The home of Governor Dawes, Saline county, which used to give all the way from eight to twelve hundred Republican majority, has now become one of the pillars in the Anti-Monopoly column.

REVOLUTIONS never go backward. The Abolitionists fought until slavery was abolished. The Anti-Monopolists of Nebraska will remain in the harness until corporate monopoly is made subservient to law.

The returns from Pennsylvania show that when the Republican party is fairly treated in that State its candidates get very comfortable majorities. The result on Tuesday is an earnest of what it will be in '84.

The Republican "reserve" did not come out in New York, but the "partial victory," as the Tribune designates it, shows that the Democracy have no more than a fighting chance for carrying it in the next Presidential campaign. That "reserve" will vote then.

DODGINS county has rebuked the slanders of Judge Savage by giving him over 1,500 majority. In view of the fact that the county is Republican by eight hundred to one thousand this is a compliment that Judge Savage can well be proud of.

TWO YEARS ago Polk county gave Samuel Maxwell, Republican, 993 votes and Munger, Democratic candidate for Supreme Judge, 8 votes. On Tuesday last Polk county gave 247 majority for Savage. It would seem the Anti-Monopoly Republicans have not repented and gone back into the line.

SENATOR ANTHONY, the oldest United States Senator in consecutive service, will probably be elected president of the Senate when that body meets in December, as Senator Edmunds wishes to be rid of the position. The Rhode Island Senator has regained his health and will enter upon his fifth Senatorial term this winter. Of the eight Senators who began new terms of service with him only Mr. Saulsbury, of Delaware, survives. Mr. Anthony is the only Senator in continuous service whose name was called March 4, 1861, when the southern members had withdrawn and the Democrats were in the minority. The importance which attaches to the presidency of the Senate, as exemplified by the death of Garfield, makes the selection of so able a man as Senator Anthony very satisfactory to the country generally.

TWO "BOSSSES" DOWNED.

The results of the voting in two States on Tuesday are matter for special congratulation by all who hold principles aloft party. In the one case that so dangerous a demagogue as Benjamin F. Butler has been repudiated by the people of the old Bay State, and that he now remains solely as a festering thorn in the flesh of the Democratic party.

The old man will doubtless be heard from in the national convention of that unhappy political organization, despite his defeat, and so long as there is anything which he considers worth the seizure his hand will be outstretched and his peculiar, not to say disreputable, methods will be employed to enforce his wishes. His present downing is all that Republicans care for. The political crockery he may smash in 1884 is not in their cupboard. The election of Mr. Robinson over him shows that the people ask for good men, and when they are presented political tricksters will be relegated to the rear. Butler has traduced the State and her people for a mean political purpose. Beyond that his administration has no feature of importance.

In Virginia Mahone has suffered a lesson not less to himself than to the Republican faction which has catered to his whims and winked at his dictatorial methods, for the sake of a success not worthy the sacrifice. The Senator has accomplished some good results in his crusade against bourbonism, and for that something is due him, but not the sacrifice of principle. The Republican party could not afford to endorse him beyond the verge it had reached in the past. While a bourbon success in Virginia is to be deplored, it is preferable to the "boss" rule of Mahone, and should be viewed in its true light, as a blessing in disguise. The battle against the victors in the latest election in Virginia should be waged on a purer basis than his, waged with persistency, waged to an unequalled success, and then will the full benefits accrue as they should, to the whole State and the country generally.

THE LATEST FROM NEBRASKA.

Returns from the various sections of the state are still incomplete, especially from the Elkhorn valley and the counties on the northeastern border. It is now definitely known that Mr. Broady, the Anti-Monopoly candidate for judge of the First district, is elected by a handsome majority. The district was Republican by fully 2,000 majority at the last judicial election in 1881, but the popularity of Mr. Broady, and notoriety of his opponent, together with the revolution created by the Anti-Monopoly movement, are responsible for the result.

The Second and Third districts elected their judges by acclamation, all parties having endorsed the same candidates. Judge A. M. Post has been elected in the Fourth district by a decisive majority, notwithstanding the heavy odds against him.

Judge Morris is elected in the Fifth over Beatty. Judge Gaslin is re-elected unanimously.

The outcome in the remaining districts is as yet unknown.

The most liberal estimates on Supreme Judge show that the majority of M. B. Reese will not exceed 4,000 and it may be wiped out entirely by returns from the northwestern counties. All the brag and bluster of the supporters of Reese about the old-time majorities are preposterous. In three or four of the counties that last year gave heavy Anti-Monopoly majorities, there has been a revulsion, owing to purely local causes. Unpopular candidates and personal controversies and railroad influence were instrumental in carrying these counties for Reese, but in the main the Anti-Monopoly lines did not waver and the vote was pretty much the same as it was last year. With three-fourths of the State press supporting Reese in a campaign that was fought almost entirely through the press, the Republican candidate should have been elected by at least 10,000 to 20,000. They have barely escaped defeat, and they must now concede that Nebraska will remain a debatable State until the demands of the Anti-Monopolists have been conceded and satisfied.

CALLING A HALT.

The business men of the country are at last becoming alarmed over the reckless inflation of railway and telegraph securities, which form the basis of financial enterprise of the greatest magnitude. Stock watering and excessive bonding have created fictitious values that threaten sooner or later to bring on a crash more disastrous than Jay Cooke's collapse in 1873. Unless a check is put upon stock watering and Credit Mobilier construction rings at a very early day Wall Street will be convulsed with a panic that will eclipse in magnitude and terrible consequences the memorable panic of Black Friday.

The New York Chamber of Commerce, at a recent meeting, has taken the initiative, and called a halt to the Goulds and Vanderbilts in their career of legalized brigandage. The following resolutions, passed by that body, will meet the hearty approval of business men all over the country: That capitalization of surplus earnings should be prohibited by law; that the increase of capital, either by stock or bonded issues, should be defined by strict legal formulas, easily understood and only permitted for good and sufficient public reasons, and not because it can be shown that a corporation can be made to pay a fair dividend on an increased capital.

That the public welfare requires that corporations should be subjected to Government supervision and control, "State or National, or both, as the case may be," by means of commissions or other methods. That such Government supervision

should have power to regulate and control, within reasonable limits, the charges of these corporations. That ordinary differences arising between these corporations and their customers should be decided by Government commissioners without the expensive and tedious delays incident to a lawsuit. That larger and more important questions should be, as now, referred to the Legislatures or the courts. That there should be no fixed limit to the rate of cash dividends corporations acting under such supervision as above indicated may pay to their stockholders, by reason of superior management of their affairs or of increased prosperity, but such questions should be left to the legislative power which created them, to decide upon the necessarily varying conditions of each case.

The Nutmeg State still keeps the control of its Legislature in the hands of the Republicans, and a Republican successor to Senator Platt will be among the results. Mr. Platt is the man distinguished, we believe, for rejecting a heavy retainer from a corporation which desired his legal services, on the honest ground that he was the servant of the people, and did not think it right to give his services to others while they were due his constituents.

CHAIRMAN DOBNEY had better revise his figures. When he bulletins Reese with ten thousand majority he shows lamentable want of political mathematics.

Balance of ticket fusion and Democratic.

RED WILLOW. INDIANOLA, November 7.—M. B. Reese has 400 majority, Wm. Gaslin about 600 majority. The Republican county ticket is elected by about 300 majority.

LINCOLN COUNTY. NORTH PLATTE, November 7.—Total vote of Lincoln county 778; State ticket, Savage, Dem., 140 majority; Judicial, Himan, Dem., 358 majority; Calkins, Dem., 62 majority; county clerk, Grady, Dem., 68 majority; treasurer, Elton, Rep., 65 majority; sheriff, Bangs, Dem., 264; county judge, Snelling, 38 majority.

BROWN. AINSWORTH, November 7.—Returns coming in very slow; indications up to 12 o'clock show a large Republican majority. Savage is running well.

BUFFALO. KEARNEY, November 7.—Buffalo county gives Republican majorities for the entire State, judicial and county tickets ranging from 200 to 800.

Sherman county gives Savage, district judge, and Barber, district attorney, about 200 majority.

KEARNEY, November 7.—Incomplete reports, which will not, however, be changed much by full reports, elect the entire Republican county ticket by pluralities ranging from 100 to 600. Sam. L. Savage, for district judge, carries this county by nearly 600 majority over Himan, and is undoubtedly elected. Bixler for district attorney has about 100 majority in this county over Calkins and is probably elected. Dawson county gives Savage and Bixler 15 majority each. Reports from Sherman county indicate a Republican majority of about 100. Reese has about 450 majority in Buffalo county.

HASTINGS, November 7.—Full returns are all in and the entire Republican ticket is elected by a large majority. The Republicans carried every precinct in the county with majorities ranging from 10 to 500. Reese's majority over Savage for Judge of the Supreme Court is 466.

HOWARD. ST. PAUL, November 7.—For Judge of Supreme Court, Reese has 94 majority; Judge of District Court, Norval, 367 majority; county treasurer, C. Jackson, 428 majority; county clerk, C. C. Robinson, 557 majority; sheriff, Johnson, 177 majority.

POLK. OSCEOLA, November 7.—The Anti-Monopoly ticket in Polk county is elected, except county judge and county clerk, which are doubtful. The majority for Savage is 247; majority for M. A. Mills, District Judge, Anti-Monopoly, 612.

CASS. PLATTSMOUTH, November 8.—The Republican State ticket has about 150 majority. The County Republican ticket is elected by majorities ranging from 150 to 250.

BUTLER. DAVID CITY, November 7.—Returns from Butler county are all except one precinct, which will make no material change in the vote. Savage has a majority of about two hundred; Williams for District Judge has a majority of about five hundred. Harper, county treasurer, is the only Republican elected. He will have a small majority.

A STALWART ESTIMATE. LINCOLN, November 7.—Returns at 10 o'clock to-night show Republican gains in almost every county on the State ticket. Reese, Republican, is elected Supreme Judge, by 10,000 majority. Broady, Democrat, is elected in the First judicial district by 3,500 majority. Three other districts not heard from are supposed to be in doubt. The Republicans elect the seven judges. Very few counties elect the straight Republican ticket, many mixed, some give Republican majorities on State ticket and elect opposition county officers, others the reverse. Generally all element united in opposition to the Republicans.

Missionary Bills. NEW YORK, November 7.—The executive committee of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal church began its annual session to-day. The following appropriations were recommended: Africa, \$4,000; South America, \$28,000; Central China, \$31,000; Foo Chow, \$15,000; North China, \$25,000; West China, \$12,000; Germany and Switzerland, \$24,000; Sweden, \$22,000; Norway, \$14,000; Denmark, \$10,000; North India, \$64,000; South India, \$10,000; Bulgaria, \$15,000; Italy, \$27,000; Mexico, \$34,000, and Japan, \$35,000.

The St. Louis Police Fight. ST. LOUIS, November 7.—At a meeting of the board of police commissioners this evening, the decision of the court of appeals annulling their act of October 9th, relating to the deposition of Chief Campbell was recognized and an order made that police captains report to Colonel Campbell. The latter thereupon took possession of the police headquarters and is on duty to-night, Chief Traffic requiring without opposition. Before adjourning, however, De Lutz, one of the commissioners preferred charges of insubordination and conduct unbecoming an officer against Colonel Campbell, and that gentleman will be tried on the charges at the next regular meeting of the board. The conspiracy case against Messrs. Lutz, Caruth, McIntire and Butler was continued to-day until the 26th inst. to give the State time to prepare for the prosecution.

The Dollar Nuisance. CINCINNATI, November 8.—The directors of the board of trade and transports at a meeting to-day, adopted the report of the committee, declaring the trade dollar a nuisance and recommending a memorial to Congress for its redemption by the government and withdrawal from circulation.
