A SCRIBE'S SEND-OFF. An Omaha Editor Deserts the Fraternity.

And is Handsomely Complimented by His Fellow-Workers. The Paxton hotel was last evening the scene of one of the pleasantest meetings ever held in Omaha, the occasion being the farewell banquet tendered Mr. William E. Annin by his fellow journalists in this city.

The banquet at the Paxton was a tribute from his co-workers, and none but members of the press were invited. Those present were Hon. Edward Rosewater, editor of THE BEE; F. M. McDonagh, editor of THE WATCHMAN; Mr. Jackson, managing editor of THE HERALD; A. Sorenson, city editor of THE REPUBLICAN; Lieut. Pollack, of the U. S. Signal office and assistant editor of THE HERALD; W. Woodbridge, city editor of THE HERALD; W. H. Kent, city editor of THE BEE; Clem Chase, reporter of THE BEE; C. V. Cole, of The Lincoln Democrat; E. E. Whitmore, of The Herald and, Lee Hensley, Mr. Richard Kitchin, one of the proprietors of the Paxton, favored the company with his presence, and sat opposite the guest of the evening, Mr. Annin, who was at the head of the table.

The Paxton hotel, which never does things by halves, had provided a magnificent feast for the boys. The table was set in the alcove which opens into their grand dining room and very inviting it looked with its load of fruit and other delicacies. Mr. Annin made a neat speech expressing his regret at leaving the field of journalism and Mr. Rosewater paid him a compliment in his response that any man might be proud to receive.
