SCANDALOUS SCENE.

A Lively Encounter Between a Husband and His Betrayed.

He is Beaten Over the Head With a Pistol.

There was a lively sensation on Harney street at an early hour Friday morning, which came near resulting in a tragedy.

On the northeast corner of Harney and 11th street, is a brick building occupied by a saloon, of which Mr. John Martin is the proprietor. Mr. Martin had in his employ for six months or so as bartender, a man named George, who, as it is stated, discharged some time ago for reasons which will appear further on.

The details of the latest transaction between the two men are thus given by an acquaintance.

The two men are of about the same age and the wife of Martin says he had been married and living with his wife in the utmost harmony for fourteen years past and never suspected her of the slightest breach of good faith. Of late however his suspicions were aroused by certain friendly relations existing between George and his wife, and the bartender was discharged. On Thursday night the latter came around to the saloon and stayed quite late, in fact until an officer notified the proprietor to close up the place. He then requested permission to lie on a sofa in the room till morning, as it was so late, and the request was granted. All retired, but none of them, as it appears, with any expectation of going to sleep. Martin "dozed with one eye open" and waited for developments which he felt sure would come.

About 2 o'clock, as the story goes, he felt his wife move and quietly slip his revolver from under his pillow. He made no resistance as he supposed she was only doing so to avoid any serious trouble. Soon after she stepped out upon the floor and went across to the sofa on which George was lying. At this Martin arose and interrupted any further proceedings but it appears that his wife had handed the revolver to George and he struck Martin across the head as he approached them, giving him a very severe blow. He followed this up with two or three other hard knocks on the side of Martin's head, which cut the scalp open and half disabled him. By this time the door was gotten open and Officer Powers appearing on the scene, the bartender and the wife were both sent out upon the street together.

Friday the woman was arrested and fined in the police court, the fine being paid by her husband, who did not want her locked up and suspected to apply for a divorce.

The whereabouts of the man who thus broke up the domestic ties were unknown up to the latest accounts.

THE WILD WEST.

A Novel and Beautiful Reproduction of a Famous Scene.

Weeks were passed in completing the work but it was at last finished and we are not afraid to say that those who see it would pardon us for saying everything in its praise. It is indeed a masterpiece for Mrs. Davis and she is entitled to feel very proud of it. The double team of horses is done in a manner worthy of Rosa Bonheur, the stage occupants are readily recognizable by their friends and Cody and Carver dashed up to the rescue with their band of cow-boys, against the band of red-skins who are making the attack, are all true to the very life. The scene on the plains and the range of hills in the background, the western sky above and the rolling dust under the horses' feet are all perfect.

Those who see it will find that the longer they study the work the more they will see to admire in the details which make up the whole, and we feel sure that Mrs. Davis will distinguish herself yet more in the future. She has the sincerest wishes of a host of friends for her success.

HUBBARD—In this city, November 11th, 1883, Mr. George E. Hubbard, aged 40 years and 1 month.

One Thousand Pounds Wanted to Bring Witnesses from South Africa.

Mass Meeting of Irish Citizens of Omaha Called for Sunday Afternoon.

Mr. John Rush has received a telegram from the "Irish World" of New York, enclosing the following cablegram from London, which explains itself.

OFFICE OF THE IRISH WORLD,
New York City.

If O'Donnell is to have a chance we must have one thousand pounds by return cable to bring witnesses from South Africa.

Fresh advices received from there today. If this be done, prospects hopeful.

Whereupon the following call has been circulated and numerously signed.

The accompanying telegram explains itself. No formality, no red tape, is necessary. We must do our duty in this emergency. We must insist that O'Donnell shall have a fair and impartial trial.

The best legal talent in the world is secured, so that it will be impossible for the British government to first sentence the victim to be hanged, and then give him a mock trial, as has so frequently been done in the past. But money must be had to secure important testimony.

Therefore we call upon you to meet in mass convention on Sunday afternoon, the 11th day of November, at 2:30 p. m., in Croome's hall, for the purpose of devising means by which to aid the brave O'Donnell in his contest with an adversary that knows neither the right of man nor the justice of law.

Brother! let Omaha do her duty. Her record in regard to past deeds is something to be proud of. See to it that we shall in this instance do all our efforts of the past. Let our motto be, "A fair trial; no perjury; no packed jury;" and if O'Donnell be proven guilty of premeditated murder, let him meet the consequences. But if he is innocent he must be saved at any cost! Let every friend of Ireland be present!
