**BRITISH GRAIN TRADE.**

London, November 26.—The Mark Lane Express' weekly review of the British grain trade says:

Unusually mild weather causes young wheat to maintain a healthy and promising appearance. Trade is dull and lifeless, owing to a superabundant supply of foreign wheat, which is being imported down river from London. Maltin barley very scarce. Foreign wheats unimproved; stock large and buyers are apathetic and extremely cautious in their importation and London trade depressed. Mixed American maize is again offered at 10s. 6d. per cwt., and the quantity of coast is very restricted. There were six arrivals, three sold, three withdrawn, four remain, including three cargoes of old winter wheat. For cargoes on passage and for shipment scarcely any demand. Value nominal. Sales of old wheat for the week, 80,102 quarters, or 20s. 10d. per quarter, against 62,157 quarters, or 18s. 10d. a quarter the corresponding week last year.
