The Rio Grande having no line east of L'enver, is unable to compete for the bust, ress, its connections not being willing to p. "orate on a 50-cent rate. It is now claime. that much of the business taken by the Union Pacific at Missouri river points at cut rates, ostensibly for Utah points, is dropped off at Denver and Colorado psints included in the Colorado pool. This has caused much bad blood among the competitors of the Union Pacific, and it is claimed that they are also cutting Coloradorates. Itisnot believed, however, that the Union Pacific desires a disruption of the Colorado pool as far as freight business is concerned. If the pool should be broken the Burlington, which has its line from Chicago to Denver would have all the advantage, as it could quote through rates to Denver and Colorado points which the Union Pacific would be unable to meet. The Denver & Rio Grande, however, has but little interest in the Colorado pool, and will force a fight if the Union Pacific continues to fight it on the Utah business. Mr. Lovejoy, the new president of the Rio Grande, when in this city a few days ago, stated emphatically that he meant to make war on the Union Pacific at all competing points, whether they are in Utah or Colorado, and that he was bound to break the Colorado pool if the Utah troubles were not settled at once. The Rio Grande would no doubt have commenced hostilities against the Union Pacific in Colorado but for the fact that by so doing it would help its hated rival, the Denver & New Orleans. Under the Colorado pooling agreement none of the Colorado roads can interchange busing t ness with the Denver & New Orleans, and this road is, therefore, compelled to occupy an isolated position.
