IN ASHES. Last Night's Fire Visitation in North Omaha.

Wm. Gentlemen's Grocery Building and Stock Burned with a Loss of \$10,000.

At a few minutes past 9 o'clock last night an alarm of fire was given from box 32. This was soon followed by a general alarm, which indicated that the fire was at William Gentlemen's grocery store, at the corner of Sixteenth and Cass streets.

The fire was found to be in the southeast corner of the building on Cass street. It spread rapidly, and although the firemen were promptly on hand, their hard work availed little.

The firemen fought the fire with the evident intent of keeping it from spreading. They succeeded in confining the fire to the building in which it started.

So rapidly was the building consumed that those who were living up stairs had barely time to escape. A family named O'Harriman lost all their goods except a few articles of clothing.

The owner of the building and goods which were lost is Mr. Wm. Gentlemen. He is one of the oldest and best known grocery men in the city.
