The surrender by ex-Governor William Sprague of the property of the Quidnick Manufacturing company marks substan-tially the close of the most remarkable egal contests recorded in the commercial nistory of the country. Rhode Island since 1811, when the grandfather of the present Sprague brothers started a print mill in the town of Cranston, has felt in her business, her politics, and even in the social relations of her people, the commanding influence of the Spragues. The successors to the original proprietor, Amasa and William Sprague, advanced the firm to a leading position among the great calico works of the country. William was the master spirit of the concern and ruled the state with dictatorial powers. He made himself governor twice and United States senator once. His peculiar political methods are still matters of lively recollection among the mature Rhode Islanders, whose votes in town meetings he bought on the spot, paying for them in calico, huge rolls of which his agents were careful to have on the spot, with all appliances for rapid mea-surement. This Elder William Sprague died in 1856, and in 1862 the mills passed into the control of his nephews, Amasa and William, the latter being the hero of the litigation of the past decade. 





Plain Facts Plainly Spoken.

At one time a discussion of the secret vice was entirely avoided by the profession, and medical works of but a few years ago would hardly mention it.

To-day the physician is of a different opinion; he is aware that it is his duty—disagreeable though it may be—to handle this matter without gloves and speak plainly about it; and intelligent parents and guardians will thank him for doing so.

The results attending this destructive vice were formerly not understood, or not properly estimated; and no importance being attached to a subject which by its nature does not invite close investigation, it was willingly ignored.

The habit is generally contracted by the young while attending school; older companions through their example, may be responsible for it, or it may be acquired through accident. The excitement once experienced, the practice will be repeated again and again, until at last the habit becomes firm and completely enslaves the victim. Mental and nervous affictions are usually the primary results of self-abuse. Among the injurious effects may be mentioned-lassitude, dejection or irrascibility of temper and general debility. The boy seeks seclusion, and rarely joins in the sports of his companions. If he be a young man he will be little found in company with the other sex, and is troubled with exceeding and annoying bashfulness in their presence.
