LOCAL BREVITIES.

Nearly all the trains arrived on time last night. The Denver westbound, on the U.P., left the depot one hour late.

A STATE COMMITTEE.

A Committee From the Senate and House Examining the Deaf and Dumb Institution.

Yesterday morning a committee of the senate and lower house composed of the following gentlemen: Messrs. A. Smith, D. F. Smith and E. M. Lore, of the senate; and Messrs. J. W. Thomas, D. P. Henry, S. M. Hagen, C. D. Emerson, Henry Williams, C. H. Lee, W. F. Thomas and Phelps Paine, of the house, arrived in Omaha and registered at the Paxton hotel.

The gentlemen came to the city for the purpose of examining the deaf and dumb institution at this place, incorporating the result in a report shortly to be presented before the legislature.

The committee went out to the asylum early in the day, and were escorted through the institution, in all its various branches and departments, by Superintendent J. A. Gillespie. The tour of inspection was a thorough one, and will enable the committee to present an intelligent report upon the condition of the institution.

Mr. Payne, the secretary, was seen last night and expressed, himself on behalf of the committee, as pleased with the way in which the asylum was managed. There were no abuses which the committee had discovered in the system upon which the asylum was conducted, and their report would be in every sense a favorable one.

The committee left on the evening train last night, some returning to Lincoln and some to their homes. They have just come from Kearney, where they completed a satisfactory inspection of the reformatory school.

A DISASTROUS RUNAWAY.

An Unfortunate Accident Which Happened to Mr. John E. Davidson Yesterday.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. John E. Davidson, who was riding down Saunders street with a young lady friend, Miss Boyden, of Washington, D. C., was thrown out of his buggy with the fair lady occupant. Mr. Davidson was not seriously injured, while Miss Boyden, badly bruised and sprained, is still alive and able to recount the ludicrous combination of circumstances which brought about the disaster.

It seems that a team of horses belonging to one of the Red Line cars, while being transferred at the end of the line, became frightened and dashed down the street. They ran for a block or so, until they struck the buggy in which Mr. Davidson and Miss Boyden were riding. The two horses separated, one going one side of the buggy and the other on the opposite, and started frantically ahead. In this three horse fashion the buggy was rapidly propelled through space, Mr. Davidson made terrific efforts to call time. At length, striking an obstacle, the buggy careered, and both occupants for the nonce commended with Mother Earth. The buggy was used up, and Mr. Davidson will hereafter keep a special lookout for runaway horses on the Red Car line.

A Brakeman Killed.

H. H. Bacon, a well known and popular young brakeman on the mountain division of the Union Pacific, was killed at Simpson by an accident to train No. 11 on Tuesday afternoon. The train was a light one, consisting, at the time of the accident, of only an engine and caboose. It ran along all right until the Y switch at Simpson was reached, when the engine jumped the track and the caboose was overturned. All the occupants were more or less injured and Bacon so seriously that he soon died. The unfortunate man was unmarried and a resident of Laramie City. He is said to have a sister living in Nebraska. His remains reached Laramie Tuesday night on freight train No. 12.

Among the injured was Dr. McGhee, of Rawlins, and the train conductor. The accident was caused by a misplaced switch.

A New Corporation. The articles of incorporation for the Omaha Investment company have been filed in the office of the county clerk. The incorporators are E. M. Everett, Z. T. Nelson and Frank L. Everett. The business of the company is to buy, sell, lease, mortgage and convey real estate, erect buildings upon real estate owned by it, or which it may acquire by lease or mortgage. The business will be conducted in Omaha.
The authorized capital stock of the corporation shall be \$50,000, in shares of \$100 each, eighty per cent. of said stock to be subscribed and paid in before commencing business. The articles specify that the existence of the company shall commence on the 1st day of January, 1885 and terminate on the 1st day of January, 1905, unless sooner dissolved by law.

A Double Track Between Omaha and Papillion.

The Union Pacific company has begun the delivery of 200,000 railroad ties at Papillion, a circumstance that would seem to indicate that the much-talked-of double track from Omaha to Papillion is a certainty. The Times has it from good authority that the construction of the new track will begin as soon as the weather will permit. This will be a big thing for Papillion. It is well known that many Omaha business men have long contemplated building homes in this beautiful suburb, but have waited because of the lack of facilities in the way of morning and evening trains between the two places. The double track and the increased business resulting therefrom will give us plenty of early and late trains. We look for a handsome building boom in Papillion next summer.
