

A FAMOUS LITIGATION.

Snits Between Two Milwankeeans That Lasted Thirty Years,

Nashville American There has just died in Milwaukee a remarkable character named John J. Orton, He was a lawyer of great ability, and man universality respected, but his life nas so full of acerbines that it sometimes seemed as though he had no friends. With an exterior as rough and hard as the rocks he was nevertheless kind-hearted explaining itself. and sympathatic, and his good deeds were numerous. He seemed to take delight in exposing the rough corners of his nature to public contact, and never appeared to care for the good or ill opinion of the world.

While justly celebrated as a lawyer, Mr. Orton gained great notoriety as a litigant. Orton retained his law practice and had something of an income but his pecularities were marked. Fin ally in 1880 some of the main suits went gainst Noonan, and the old man having to more money let the others go. the thirty years of litigation he had begun reds of thousands of dollars. He was now a physical and financial wreck. went to Wa hington and secured some partments from republicans who known him as the friend
