THE prospects are quite favorable for the passage of a law prohibiting alien wnership in the territories. The senate committee on public lands has favorably reported the bill with some amendments, providing that allens must become citizens if they wish to become landowners in the territories. One of the amendments provides that no railroad shall hereafter own lands in the territories except such as are necessary for their operation and have been granted by congress, and all such heading off the Texas & Pacific lands whether acquired before or after the passage of this act, which are not engineer, would be killed in an accident that necessary for the operation of the compantes shall be disposed of within ten years after the bill is passed, and if not disposed of shall be forfelted to the United States; and all property acquired in violation of this act shall be forfeited to the United States. This is a very healthy amendment, and the bili as a whole will meet with general approval at the hands of the people. If passed, as we think it will be, it affects the ownership of from 25,000,000 to 30,000,000 acres of land in the territories that are now held by forelga syndicates and aliens who never intend to become citizens of this country, but who propose to establish a system of absentee landlordism which has caused so much dissatisfaction and trouble in Europe. These foreigners will either have to become citizens or convey their lands to persons who are citizens.
