### LONDON STOCK MARKET.

London, March 25.—The stock market at the close to-day was depressed under the influence of an increase in preparations for war. Consols closed at 97 1/16, the lowest figure yet reached since the commencement of the Anglo-Russian dispute. Russians fell 1 to 1 1/2 per cent this afternoon. News from the continent shows all bourses sympathize with the financial situation in London, and prices toward the close were flat.
