MR. BOYD'S APERCH.

Gentlemen: The presence of so many men and such a demonstration as I see before me touches my heart and I would be less than human if I falled to appreciate

and acknowledge them. The battle is over; the smoke has cleared off and we can now calmly look over the field where yesterday the opposing forces met. On the one side were gathered those who favored the suppression of rlot and disorder and the protection of laboring men in their peaceful employment and pursuits. On the other side were those-in part at least-who held opposite views. The issue yesterday was shall men who wish to work be protected or shall they be maltreated and driven from their work, their tools thrown into the ditch and special policemen sent there to protect them, be beaten and driven away.

This issue was exaggerated and harped upon, and many men were made mad and desperate against the man who has always been the triend of the laboring For thirteen years I have worked and know what the word means in all its senses and applications. I have always labored and bired laboring men and I defy any man to point to a single instance of oppression by me of the laboring man. [Here the speaker was cheered lustily.]
