THE BASE BALL SEASON To be Opened in Omaha To-day

The fact of the matter is that this city has almost as good chances of success in the baseball field as any other city represented in the league.

It is not idle talk to say that when our nine becomes thoroughly practiced, so that its constituent members are able to play in thorough unison, it will be second to no organization in the league in point of ability.

A Runaway Race. Pat Comiskey, a Connell Bluffs hack-driver, who figured in the McClellan-Forbes-Lottie Combs affair, and was put under bond for threatening Lottie Combs, was charged sometime ago in Connell Bluffs and put under bonds to answer to the charge of robbery.

A TUSSELE FOR A TOUGH. Moore, alias McFarland, alias Morgan, Wanted by the Authorities.

An Interesting Battle in the Police and County Courts for the Possession of the Man.

Yesterday witnessed a struggle in local legal circles for the possession of one of the most notorious crooks and confidence men in the west.

Thursday night Farrell arrived in this city from Mills county armed with requisition papers, from the governor of Iowa, and extradition papers from the chief executive of Nebraska, for the man of the "three M's" alias, an escaped convict from the penitentiary of the Buckeye state.

In the meantime Charley Green, McFarland's attorney, had procured a writ of habeas corpus in the county court for the purpose of staying off proceedings against Farrell.

Mr. Green dismissed the proceedings of habeas corpus, and the prisoner was at once taken charge of by the city authorities, headed by Marshal Cummings.

Right at this point the police made a gross mistake, and at once hurrying Moore, alias McFarland, alias Morgan, immediately over to the low side of the river, in the care of Sheriff Farrell.

Mr. Green immediately went to the jail, and there he was met by Sheriff Farrell, who commanded him to bring the body of the prisoner into court.

The Mills county sheriff demurred, but finally went with his charge to the steps of the county court building, where he finally refused to go any further, on the ground that the writ of service was incorrectly drawn up, in stating that the man's name was Morgan, when it really it was Moore.

While this dispute was going on, the prisoner broke away and started to run up the county court room, but was stopped by Farrell, who quickly re-secured him.

At 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon all the parties to this triangular tussle appeared in court and the attorney for the man Morgan, alias "what-you-mind-to-call-him," asked for a continuance to enable him to prepare an answer or defense to the return made by Sheriff Farrell.

From this morning Farrell, who had been compelled to appear in the case before he could consult counsel, arose and asked the court to consider the effect of the motion; he made a plain, business talk to Judge McCulloch, and closed with the strongly worded statement that he was ready for the test and ready to answer now.

The Courts. In the district court on yesterday two news suits were filed, viz: Hendrix vs. Revins et al, and Frank Walter vs. the Millard Hotel company.

Schnelder vs. Goodheart was dismissed at the cost of the plaintiff. The remainder of the session was taken up in hearing motions and arguments in the habeas corpus case reported elsewhere.
