Stocks—The feature of today's stock market has been the heavy trading in Lackawanna, accompanied by a decided break in its price during the forenoon, followed later by a rally in which about one-fourth of the loss was recovered. The rest of the market was quiet, and while it sympathized to a certain degree with the movements in Lackawanna, the fluctuations were within a much narrower range, and with the exception of the morning break, prices were steady to strong all day.

During the last hour and a half the whole list responded to upward movements and prices advanced slowly but steadily to the close of the board. The result of the day's operations shows a gain of a small fraction, generally from 1 to 1¢ for the most active in the list.
