SHOOTING WELL IN A BUNCH

Marksmen Keep Up the Tremendous Clip Started on Monday.

MAKING SOME VERY HIGH AVERAGES

Ninety Per Cent is Nowhere Among the Lenders and the Money is Many Times Divided Among Winners.

Ten more events at the targets were pulled off in the tournament of the Nebraska Sportsmen's association yesterday, the second day of the affair. The entries were a little larger than on the opening day and all the events were even more closely contested. The cracks are running at a 90 per cent clip and some of the squads are doing even better than that.

Every race was hard run. There was an average of thirty-seven entries to the event and an average of thirty-one and a haif came in on the moneys. The closest race was in the sixth event on the card, when thirty-three out of the thirty-five entries got a piece. To roll up such scores the shooters are doing some of the prettiest work at the traps over seen in this part of the country.

The highest average was a bit larger than the day before. It was made jointly by Glibert and LeRoy, who each cracked 195 of the 200 targets thrown. Heikes came second with the same score as on Tuesday, 194. Next came Budd with 193, Grimm with 192 and Elliott with 190.

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
