CASTELAR CREATES A STIR

Republican Leader Criticises the Queen Regent and He May Be Prosecuted by the Government.

MADRID, June 1 .- 8 p. m .- An article signed by Senor Emilio Castelar, the distinguished republican statesman, which recently appeared in the Petite Revue Inter nacionale and which has been reproduced in Spanish papers, that are being prosecuted for their production, has caused a great sensation. Senor Castelar attacks the queen regent, repreaching her with being a foreigner and unpopular and with interfering unjustifiably in political affairs. He compares her present position with that of Queen Marie Antoinette on the eve of the French revolution.

The matter came before the senate today, Duke de Roca demanding the prosecution of Castelar, and other senators expressing in violent terms their indignation at Senor Castelar's conduct.

Senor Capdepon, the minister of the interior, announced that the matter had already been placed before the law officers. Marshal Martinez de Campos described Senor Castelar's conduct as "idiotic" and called upon the government to act energetically, declaring that parliamentary immunity must not be allowed to generate into impunity. He said he feared the Chamber of Deputies might refuse to authorize a prosecution.

The duke of Tetuan, minister of foraffairs in the cabinet of the late Canovas del Castillo, and in the brigade. the president of the senate, Senor Rios, endorsed the utterances of Mar. shal de Campos, while senators generally extolled the queen regent and protested against the obnoxious article.

El Imparcial, which represents the repub licans, handles Senor Castelar roughly for his "unpatriotic conduct" and reproaches him for accepting the post of counsellor to an English company at Algeoiras and for working entirely in favor of foreigners." El Imparcial hints that "senility threatens to deprive Senor Castelar of the reputation of a great career.

Castelar's article has had all the greater effect because it seems to show that he has modified his decision to retire from political life in deference to the wishes of those desiring to put him forward as a possible president of a republic.

TO DISTINGUISH CHAPLAINS

Those Accompanying the Army Are to Bear a Special Mark of Their

Service on Their Uniforms. TAMPA, Fla., June 12 All of the chap-lains who will accompany the troops of the United States into Cuba, or wherever else the soldiers may be seasy will wear uniforms with a distinctive badge of their calling on the collars of their coats. Heretofore,

chaplains have not had iniforms by which they could be distinguished. In 1893 at a meeting of the army chaplains in Chicago, Father Erward J. Vattman. chaplain with the Fourth United States infantry, recently stationed at Fort Sheridan, Ill., was given power to decide on a chaplains' uniforms and to secure them. There was a strong feeling, however, against emphasizing the military character of chaplains and for this reason the matter until this time has been allowed to rest.

But opinion on this subject has recently undergone a change and the chaplains now believe there are many reasons why they should have a distinctive mark by which they may be easily recognized, thus enabling them to be of better service to the soldiers in the field. A meeting of all the chaplains present at Tampa was held today and the matter laid before General Miles.

The commanding general promptly authorized the chaplains to wear the color of the new Kharks cloth uniforms now be ind distributed to the troops for summer wear, a light brown. On the collars of the conts the chaplains will wear the letters, "U. S." and a Roman cross in gold. These uniforms will be furnished at once On orders of Adjutant General Corbin.
