# Provision of the Amendment.

The amendment as agreed to follows: The secretary of the treasury will imme diately cause to be coined as fast as possi-ble into standard dellars an amount of not less than \$4,000,000 per month, which shall be of like weight and fineness, and like legal tender quality, as those provided for under existing law, all the silver bullion now held ject of the Colorado senator's sophomoric

That the secretary of the treasury is authorized and directed to issue, as said silver is coined, silver certificates of similar design and denominations, and of the same quality, payable and redeemable in like manner, as those authorized by law, to the amount of the gain or seigniorage from the purchase of silver bullion by the treasury by the act of July 14, 1890, until the sum of \$12,000,000 shall have been issued.

That all said money which shall be coined, including amounts of gains or seigniorage, shall be used both for the redemption of treasury notes heretofore issued by, and un-der the act of July 14, 1890, and for the redemption of the certificates issued unde
