Engene Moore's Trial.

In the Eugene Moore case in district court today the examination of the witnesses for the state was completed. The testimony introduced proved conclusively that Moore had received the \$250 fee from . the Omaha Fire Insurance company while he was acting as state auditor. It also showed that since retiring from the office Moore had paid over to the state \$4,000, being a part of the money due for fees. This afternoon after the state had completed its showing the attorneys for Moore fied a motion asking that the jury be instructed to bring in a verdict for the defendant, relying on the theory that the prisoner should be presumed to be innocent and that the further presumption must be getting a good start in the cornfields. that the \$250 fee from the Omaha insurance company was included in the \$4,000 payment made by Moore.

The testimony today cleared up one matter about which there has been much controversy. During the spring of 1897 Moore had \$4,000 deposited in a Lincoln bank. He years, something that will be different than drew out \$1,500 and paid it over to the state treasurer. Shortly afterward the balance, \$2,500, was paid over. It was industriously circulated at that time that Moore had attempted to draw out and secrete this money, and was only prevented from doing by the vigilance of certain popocratic officials. The bank officials suggested to MacColl that a check be issued direct to the treasurer. MacColl went back to Moore, had the check made out in that form, and turned it over to the state, the state officials having nothing to do with the matter at the bank, and Moore making no objection to the course suggested by the back officials.
