CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 10 .- (Special.)-The herd of buffalo owned by the Duprees on the Cheyenne is likely to increase to large proportions ere long if present plans are carried out. A large pasture is being fenced in on the Cheyenne reservation, in which the growing buffalo herd will be kept inclosed in the future. But little care has been given to them in the last years, but when they are placed in a pasture to themselves, it is expected that they will increase rapidly. The herd now consists of thirty head of full bloods and about fifty cross breeds. The full bloods alone will be placed in the pasture, which consists of several interior department and the work is being rapidly pushed. This is one of the few herds of buffalo which is yet known to be in existence in the country.
