Advertising for Offers of a Site for the Proposed Pacific Building-What is to Be Gained by the Move.

In accord with the determination and instructions of the Board of Education, Secretary Gillan has commenced advertising for proposals for the sale of real estate for a echool site somewhere in the district bounded by Mason, Pierce, Eighth and Twelfth streets. The proposals must be handed in to the secretary by 4 o'clock of June 18. The new site will take the place of the present Pacific school.

This is the last step in the scheme to redistrict the eastern part of the city for school purposes. The other was taken in the purchase at the last board meeting of additional land adjoining the present Cass school site. On these two sites will be erected additional rooming capacity to accommodate all the children who formerly attended the Cass, Pacific and Dodge school. There wil be no school to replace the Dodge school. President Jordan and the other members

of the board have decided upon this plan. They believe that all the eastern par of the city is now too near the business portion of the city to be desirable, for a school building. They figure that the value of land in that portion is so much higher than to the north and south that it will be economy to go farther away. A central dividing line will be formed and children living to the north will go to the Cass school and to the south to the Pacific.

The determination of the board to purchase a new site to the south was decided upon in view of the fact that no additional real estate adjoining the present location could be secured except for several times its value. It has been some time since the school could accommodate the tributary pupils and now that another contingent from the north is to be added more capacity was necessary. But as soon as the board at tempted to purchase adjoining land the owners boosted up the prices so that the board determined to look elsewhere. This is believed to be economy, because other grounds can be secured cheaper away from the present site and the board will hold a valuable piece of property in the present location, which it will some day be able to sell at a good price.

The board succeeded in getting land nex to the present Cass school site without trouble. A full lot to the west and on the corner was obtained and another twentytwo feet to the east. Upon this is to be erected a structure of some eight rooms, so fashioned that an addition can be tacked onto it after the present building become worthless. It has not been fully determined but it is believed that the new Pacific school will contain some twelve or fifteen rooms.

SOUTH OMAHA NEWS.

Assessor Etter of the First ward com pleted his work yesterday and turned over his books. The records show the following assessment: Lands, \$23,415; lots, \$479,555; personal, \$98,766; total, \$601,736. The returns for the Fourth ward were turned over to the county clerk Thursday, but were sent back on account of the footings not having been made. Two wards are now in, the First and Second, and as the valuation for these two wards does not reach \$1,000,000 it is feared the total valuation will fall short of the amount estimated, which was \$2,000,000. Last year the valuation was \$1,698,000 and with a levy of 44% mills the revenue deived amounted to \$64,226.

While the estimates for the coming fiscal year have not been completed it is thought that at least \$80,000 will be needed to meet the running expenses of the city. With the growth of the city the expenses naturally increase. Better fire and police protection are needed and people want more crosswalks, electric lights, fire hydrants, etc. All these things take money and it takes the utmost economy on the part of the city officials now to worry along with the funds at hand. The overlap, if any, will be small this year on account of the increase in the occupation tax, as the additional \$7,000 secured from this source will go a long ways toward paying off accumulated debts. Just at the present time the city's finances are in good shape, the May bills and salaries having been paid and a balance remaining in most of the funds. The recent rains will be a severe drain upon the street repair fund, it being estimated that the damage done to unpaved streets and alleys will

amount to fully \$1,000. While there is no definite information on the subject it is reported that the packing house assessments have either remained the same as last year or else have been slightly reduced. If this is true a mistake of some ort has been made as all of the packers have built additions during the last ten months and have increased their capacity. Extensive additions have also been made at the stock yards. All of the packing houses re in the Fourth ward with the exception of the Swift plant and the increase in valuation if any can readily be ascertained as soon as the totals for the Fourth ward are The city council will meet as a Board of

Equalization on June 20 to equalize the assessments just made. The annual levy vill be made at the first regular meeting of the council in July.

Want Vinton Street Improved. A petition is being circulated among the ousiness men urging the city council to take some action toward having Vinton street, between Twentieth and Twentyfourth streets, placed in a passable condi-The intention is to have Mayor Ensor appoint a committee of the council to wait upon the mayor and council of Omaha to see what can be done. At least one dozen heavy drays are engaged in hauling freight from Omaha to this city and accidents are continually happening on Vinton street, Yeserday afternoon traffic on the car line was uspended for three-quarters of an hour on account of a heavily laden wagon breaking lown so near the car track that trains could ot pass. An immense amount of heavy hauling between this city and Omaha is constantly going on. Freight for the local retail stores is billed to Omaha for the reaon that it can be hauled down in teams much cheaper and much more quickly. Besides the hauling for the business houses here the packers are constantly using a arge number of teams in the hauling of meats, etc., to Omaha. Large quantities of building material come down here from omaha and all these teams tend to cut up the road. It is desired that Vinton street be paved with stone as it is stated that no ther pavement would stand the heavy loads.

The packers agreed to appoint a representative on the committees and as soon as this delegation is made up there will be a meeting at which the committees will be named.
