#### DR. CHADWICK DROPS DEAD

Well Known Physician and Surgeon Suddenly Expires in His Office Chair.

Dr. P. M. Chadwick, an old resident of Omaha, died suddenly in his office in the Barker block last evening a few minutes before 6 o'clock. The cause of his death was heart failure. The deceased was a brother of Mrs. William J. Connell, but left no family. His death caused great surprise and sincere regret among a wide circle of friends. He was about 45 years of age and had been a practicing physician here for a number of years. During the day he complained of feeling unwell and he had been forced to call the elevator boy of the Barker block in to get him medicine several times during the morning. He then complained of nothing but a severe pain in the stomach. The boy had just left him last evening when he fell to the floor. Dr. Galbraith was hurriedly called, but when he arrived he pronounced Dr. Chadwick dead.

Dr. Chadwick was a graduate of the University of Vermont and of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of New York. For several years he was connected with Bellevue hospital in the city of New York. For the last ten years he has been in active practice in Omaha. His remains will be taken to his old home in St. Johnsbury, Vt., accompanied by Mrs. Connell and her son




