AMERICAN CORN ABROAD "Cornbrod" Murphy's Missionary Work Yields Good Returns.

The statistics of the foreign consumption of American corn prove that when Jerry Rusk as secretary of agriculture sent Colonel Murphy abroad to preach a corn propaganda he knew what he was about. It will be remembered that Colonel Murphy gave a particularly impressive corn dinner to distinguished people in Paris. In 1892 the export of corn to France amounted to 2,034.25 bushels. In 1897 it had risen to 7,092,156

bushels. In the nine months of the present crop year the point touched in the preceding twelvemonth has been reached and passed. the corn exported to France during nine months amounting to 7,877,063 bushels. And the French are not partial to corn either. Germany, which imported 13,900,000 bushels in 1892, took 31,700,000 last year, and her importation for the current year will exceed that amount. The whole amount of corn exported from the United States in 1891 was 32,000,000 bushels; in 1892, 75,000,000 bushels. and in 1897, 177,000,600 bushels. For the first nine months of the current crop year it has been 4,000,000 in excess of the corresponding period of 1897. It takes a famine year to get Europeans to try corn, but when they once try it, some of them stick to it.
