Secretary Porter has had his troubles all along, but it is explained that many of his mistakes have been made from sheer awkwardness. His connection with the recount business and his act in destroying the tally sheets are expected to give him the most trouble in the election, although he was alded and abetted in both moves by the popocratic allies of all colors and brands.
