The Willow Springs distillery in this city, including the Her & Co. distributing establishment here, has been absorbed into the Standard Distilling and Distributing company. The new corporation, or trust, the outside concerns by the new company involved the purchase of twelve distilleries. In addition all the important distributing companies in the United States are included one of the most important industrial moves in recent years.

It was announced at the office of the fler company here yesterday afternoon that Mr. Her would continue the management of the local houses of the new trust and that there would be no change whatever in the operation of them.

The name of the new concern is the Standard Distilling and Distributing company, to operate under a New Jersey charter. It has an easy working capacity of 35,000 bushels of corn, or 161,000 gallons of spirits per day. Its immediate output will require 18,000 bushels of corn per day. The capital stock amounts to \$24,000,000. The deal was consummated in New York by Levy Mayer, the Chicago corporation lawyer.

An idea of the extent of the trust may be gained from the following list of properties which have already been purchased: Willow Springs distillery, Omaha, including the Her & Co. distributing establishment in this city; Mutual distillery, Union Town, Ky.; American distillery, Pekin, III.; American Distributing company, which owns the Indiana and the Majestic distilleries at Terre Haute, Ind., and distributing houses in New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Terre Haute; Atlas distillery, Peoria, Ill., with the Peoria Malting company's plant and the National Distributing company of New York, with a branch at Baltimore; the Globe distillery, Pekin, Ill.; Hanover distillery, Peoria, Ill.; Mill Creek distillery Cincinnati, including the distributing establishment there; Missouri distillery, St. Louis, including the Mound City Distilling company's establishments at St. Louis and Kansas City.
