Soldiers Open Fire

"The troops from Santiago had rushed down when the news of the Merrimac's coming was told, and soldiers lined the forts and cliffs, firing wildly across and killing each other. The Merrimac's steering gear broke as it got to Estrella point. A huge submarine mine caught it full amidships, hurling the water high in the air, and tearing a great rent in the Merrimac's side Its stern ran up to Estrella point. Chiefly due to the work done by the mine, it began to sink. At that time it was across the channel, but before it settled it drifted around:

We were all aft lying on the deck. Shells and bullets whistled around. Sixinch shells from the Vizcaya came tearing into the Merrimac, and passing clear through, while the plunging shots from the fort broke through its decks.

"'Not a man must move," I said and it was only owing to the splendid discipline of the men that all of us were not killed as the shells rained over us and minutes became hours. The men's mouths grew perched, but we must lie there till daylight, I told them.

"Now and again some other man, lying with his face glued to the deck, and wondering whether the rext shell would not come our way, would say: 'Hadn't we better drop off now, sir?" but I said, 'Wait till daylight. It would be impossible to get the catamaran anywhere but to the shore, where the soldiers stood shooting, and I hoped that by daylight we might be

recognized and saved. 'The grand old Merrimae kept sinking. I wanted to go forward to see the damage done there, where nearly all the fire was directed, but one man said if I rose it would draw all the fire on the rest, so I lay motionless. It was splendid the way those men behaved. The fire of the soidiers, the batteries and the Vizcaya was

When the water came up to the deck the catamaran floated over, but we caught hold of it. One man thought we were safer right there. The fire has ceased, except on the New York launch, and I feared Ensign Powell and his men had been killed. "A Spanish launch came toward the Merrimac. We agreed to capture it and run. Just as it came close the Spaniards saw us and half a dozen marines jumped up and pointed their rifles at our heads.

Surrender to Cervera. "Is there any officer in that boat to receive a surrender of prisoners of war?" I shouted. An old man lenned out from under the awning and waved his hand. It was Admiral Cervera. The marines lowcred their rifles and we were helped into

"Then we were put in cells in Morro. It was a grand Bight, a few days later, to see the bombardment, to see the shells bursting Santiago. I had the court-martial room in the barracks. My men were kept prison-

"From my window I could see the army pits in front of me.

Yesterday the Spanish became as polite as could be. I knew something was coming and then I was exchanged," Hobson was overloyed to get back. He

looked well. On the whole the Spaniards treated him better than might have been expected. Mr. Ramsden, the British sednsul at Santiago, was tireless in his efforts to secure comfort for Hobson and his men. The young hero knew nothing about the destruction of Cervera's fleet until he reached the lines.
