Mallalieu, in his capacity of superintendent of the In-Iustrial school, sold to the Oxnard Beet Bugar company at Grand Island twenty-two tarloads of beets, the property of the state of Nebraska, for which he was paid the sum of \$1,186.07. In 1892 he sold to the same company forty-three carloads of bects for \$2.855.54 in 1892 seven carloads for \$442.88, in 1894 twelve carloads for \$663.36, in 1895 twenty-eight carloads for \$1,912.23 and in 1896 thirty-three carloads for \$1,921.58. The total amount received by him for the sugar beets belonging to the state was \$8,981.66, whereas he only accounted to the state for \$5,009.19. On this deal the state wants \$3,972.56. It is also alleged that in the fall of 1892 Mr. Mallalieu sold to D. M. Ferry & Co. \$185.72 worth of seed belonging to the state, and that he refused to account for it in any manner Again, in December, 1896, he sold to David Landreth & Sons 3,000 pounds of "White Spine" cucumber seed for \$424.50 and turned over to the state only \$124.50, leaving a deficit of \$300. The petition states that Mr Mallalleu has converted to his own use \$4,458.39, and asks, in addition to judgment for the same, with interest, that the defendant shall pay the costs.

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
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
