OBTERS REPORT A LARGE JULY TRADE

Barring South Omaha Labor Troubles General Situation as Regards Business is Most Encouraging in All Industrial Departments.

The strike in the South Omaha packing houses is the only cloud that has arisen in some weeks past to darken the business horizon and it is probable that even that will soon be dispelled. While it lasts, however, it is bound to affect to some extent stock market and related industries, but the general business situation is still very satisfactory. In every department of trade only good reports are given out, and there is something in the manner of those most deeply interested that says more plainly than words, that no other reports could be made if the truth is to be adhered to.

Both jobbers and retailers are having plenty to do and it is safe to say that mercantile men are busier during the month of July as they are at any time. The retailers all admit that they are reaping a very substantial benefit from the position in the way of trade from strangers who, during their visit, find it necessary or convenient to make some little purchases.
