cuit court for the southern district of lowa referees reads:

Courts of bankruptcy shall within the territorial limits of which they have respectively jurisdiction appoint referees, each for a term of two years, and may, in their Probably no service held within its walls discretion, remove them because their serv ees are not needed or for other cause; and designate and from time to time change the limits of the districts of the referees, so that each county where the services of a referee are needed may constitute at least day was spent in strolling about the grounds one district.

Secretary Alger expressed his deep gratification at the culmination of the Santiago campaign. had fully expected the surrender to be formally carried out at 9 o'clock this morning, according to General Shafter's telegram last night, and it was a relief to know that the last chance for parley and Spanish diplomacy had passed and that our flag vas now flying over the city.

Plack of American Soldiers. "It is a magnificent achievement," said he, "and most of all, it is a tribute to the bravery, pluck and endurance of our American soldiers. Now that their efforts have brought final and complete success, I believe their campaign will be recorded as one of the most glorious pages of our military history. Not more than 10,000 thousand men were engaged when the most serious fighting occurred, but they pushed forward and created a condition which has brought

the surrenber of 25,000 men." Later in the afternoon the official dispatch came from General Shafter, giving in brief military fashion an unusually clear statement from the officer of the day's events. It was entirely satisfactory from every point of view, showing that the Amermoment later, after the flag was up, and lean army was in complete control of the city, which it would have cost 5,000 lives to capture by storm. Consider Advance on Porto Rico. The president, after his return from church, had a conference with Secretaries Alger and Long and Captain Crowninshield, chief of the Bureau of Navigation, and number of the members of the naval Wat board. It was stated after the meeting that plans had been discussed for an aggressive movement in which the army and navy will take part, against Porto Rico. Before going to the White House Secretary Alger had been in conference with General Brooke for two hours. They had before them a large number of maps of Porto Rico and the plans of campaign were discussed from every point of view. It is expected that General Miles will go direct from Santiago to Porto Rico and that General Stone and Colonel Michaeler of his staff will leave from New York in a day or two on the Resolute to join the general at Santiago. Secretary Long would not discuss the naval program, ex-

cept to say that active preparations are on foot for the next forward movement. During the day Secretary of War Alger endorsed the plan of Colonel Hooker for the transportation of the Spanish forces at Santiago back to Spain. It provides for an aggregate of 1,000 Spanish officers with firs class cabin accommodation and 24,000 goldiers with third class steerage passage. The circular says that the Spanish forces will be delivered on board at Santiago for transportation to Cadiz, Spain, or such other ports as may be designated. It is provided that the accommodations are to be kept up to the standard required by the United States' regulations as to officers and men n regard to galleys, ventiliation, etc. The subsistence furnished is to be equal to the prescribed United States army rations, which is set forth in detail as a guide to


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
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
