NEWFOUNDLAND INTERESTED

Canada Would Be Short-Sighted to Ignore That Colony in Convention.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., July 29.—Receiver General Morin, commenting on the expressions of some Canadian papers that Newfoundland was not to be allowed representation in the international commission to meet shortly at Quebec for the settlement of the questions at issue between the United States and Canada, points out that Newfoundland practically controls the supply of bait for the whole north Atlantic fisheries. He suggests that if Canada should be selfish and ignore Newfoundland, the colony could refuse to assent to any agreement concluded at Quebec. The effect of this would be to prevent American fishermen from securing bait in Newfoundland waters, thus destroying the fishery on the banks. In Mr. Morin's opinion the United States is not likely to consent to any convention on the fishery question unless satisfied that Newfoundland concurs. Canada's trade with Newfoundland now equals that of the United States with the colony, but slight changes of tariff could throw the main volume of trade again into American hands. Furthermore, Mr. Morin contends the fishery convention, which Newfoundland has already negotiated with the United States, shows that the Americans regard the Newfoundland concessions of great value and better terms will be obtainable from the Americans if Canada and Newfoundland were united on the commission. Mr. Morin, however, does not believe the Canadian ministry will refuse Newfoundland membership on the commission.

Denials of Hooley's Charges. LONDON, July 29.—Denials of the allegations made by Great Trawl Hooley, the company promoter, in the bankruptcy court continue to be published here. The Duke of Somerset writes that he was of course ignorant that his co-directors had accepted money until he read Mr. Hooley's evidence, and then he adds, needless to say, he forthwith retired from the directorate of the Dunlop company. The duke's denial is emphatic and flatly denies that he received a penny of the Hooley money.

Not So Bad Off as Are the Eskimos on the Land—Officers Have a Quarrel. SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—A correspondent writing from Point Barrow, under date of April 4, regarding the leeward whalers who have recently received relief, says: "The whaling will be resumed on August 25. The inland Eskimos are staying and are coming to the coast for food. The men are all well. A deer station will probably be started here next year if the feed proves sufficient. Kelly, saltmaker of the Orca, committed suicide on March 30. Constant communication is kept up between the various vessels of the whaling fleet. On February 3, trouble, which had been brewing between Captain Mason and the officers and crew of the Joanne, culminated in Mason driving Mate Coffin away from the ship at the point of a rifle. He fired several shots at him. Coffin made his way back to the store house, secured a can of roast mutton and set out for the new port, twenty-five miles distant. The thermometer registered very low and a blizzard came on in which Coffin lost his way and wandered for three days and nights on the ice before reaching the new port. He is now at the refuge station.

Severe Storm in England. LONDON, July 29.—The northeast coast of this country has been swept by a great storm. The fishing fleets have had a narrow escape, being obliged to relinquish all their gear and nets and run to the harbors for shelter, where many other vessels were compelled to seek refuge. The northbound trains have been delayed by the force of the wind, which has caused considerable damage inland, the crops having been flattened.

Hiemack on the Improve. HAMBURG, July 29.—The Nachrichten learns from Friedrichsruhe that the prince Hiemack had supper with his physician, Dr. Sevensinger, left Friedrichsruhe last night.
