

The lines of these designs, relates the New York Press, are painted on the floor or laid out by means of brass-headed nails, and it s no easy matter to design a flag accurately ven with the help of these lines. The largest American flag made by the government is called No. 1. It measures

\$4.86 feet in length and 13.12 in breadth, and is rarely used. Probably the Detroit and Minneapolis are the only ones of Uncle Sam's ships that regularly use this size. The size known as No. 2, which is considerably smaller, is the popular size, and is the one used by most of the war ships. In addition to this one flag, all the different sizes below it are carried by each of the cruisers and war ships. The bunting which Uncle Sam uses is tested severely before being used.
