AMERICAN FLAG IS TORN DOWN BY TROOPS

Deputation Appeals to General Wilson for Help and Protection.

(Copyright, 1898, by Associated Press.) PONCE, Porto Rico, Aug. 15.—Evening—White flags flutter at the Spanish and American outposts and all is quiet. The first report of outrages by the Spaniards within their lines has been brought to the headquarters of General Wilson today by a priest who headed a deputation of about twenty miles northeast of Utuado...

PACIFIC TALK BY WHITE

Ambassador Reminds the Germans that "Dollar Worship" is Not All of America's Patriotism.

BERLIN, Aug. 16.—Andrew D. White, the United States ambassador, before starting at noon today for Hamburg, where he will render the usual annual report to the emperor to the correspondent of the Associated Press:

So far as I can see the state of things between Germany and the United States remains satisfactory. Throughout the war the German government has treated us fairly and so far as seeing any cause for complaint, on our part, it seems to be that the fairness of the German government's attitude requires recognition.

With regard to their sending forces to the Philippines, that matter has already been fully cleared up. There was nothing whatever in it to disturb the friendship of the United States, nor was there any purpose to interfere with our operations.

With regard to German reaching after colonies or extending their influence in the east, I have never hesitated to avow myself as heartily in favor of such undertakings. I regard every establishment of such spheres of activity as a benefit to the world at large.

Every part of the world is being brought into touch with civilization by a power like Germany is a clear gain, not only to Germany, but to the United States and to all other civilized powers.

I rejoice in the return of peace and I believe that the conduct of the war with such amazing vigor and effect, and the government's capacity to conceive noble deeds had yielded to the passion for money grabbing.

As to the public at large, if it ponders the subject, it can hardly fail to be struck with the desire of the United States to be fair and just to Spain, even to be kindly and to avoid everything that can injure its pride and sensibilities.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—The mustering out of the volunteer army raised in defense of the union against the armies of Spain practically began at the War department today and will be continued until the army has been placed on a basis consistent with our present relations to the nations of the earth.

Orders were prepared today for the mustering out of about 35,000 volunteers, including nearly twenty-five regiments of infantry and about eight troops of cavalry and five or six batteries of artillery.

The details of the order bearing on this subject have not yet been fully perfected and the officials confine themselves to general statements in regard thereto. It was admitted that the first regiment of Vermont volunteers, attached to the Third army corps, camped at Camp Sherman, O., had been ordered to proceed to Fort Ethan Allen, Vt.

Adjutant General Corbin said that a similar response to a direct inquiry on the subject of other volunteer regiments selected for mustering out. They would, he said, be ordered to their state capitals as soon as it could be done without danger to the interests of the government and mustered out of the military service as rapidly as possible.

Formal announcement of the plans of the department on this subject are being deferred pending the receipt of certain desired information from Major General Merritt, commanding the military forces in the Philippines. Advice is hourly expected from him on this subject.
