

S A., retired, on the charge of conduct unbe oming an officer and a gentleman. The case is a peculiar one, in that it involves the right of the military authorities to compe retired officer of the army to submit himself to the jurisdiction of a state court for

the satisfaction of a private obligation. The courts of Maryland granted the petiion of the wife of Captain Shufeldt for divorce and decreed the payment of alimon to a certain amount.
