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FILIPINOS NEVER RECOGNIZED

Lodge Resents Declaration that United States Attacked Its Allies.

MORGAN DISCUSSES THE RACE QUESTION

Allen Offers a Resolution—Stewart Gives Notice of Financial Speech—Teller Not Surprised at Pension Roll.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—During a discussion today of a resolution of inquiry offered by Pettigrew of South Dakota, some sensational statements were made in the senate regarding the attitude of the United States toward the Filipino insurgents.

Morgan discussed at length the race question in the south, basing his remarks upon a resolution offered by Pritchard, republican of North Carolina. He deemed it imperative that some course should be adopted which would prevent a repetition of the Hayes-Tilden controversy and discussed fully the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the constitution. He maintained that to force the black race into a social and political equality with the white race is only to prolong the progress of all mankind. The speech was a strong appeal for action that would benefit both races, and a defense of the constitutions of Louisiana and North Carolina.

McLaurin of South Carolina gave notice of an amendment to the pension bill, which would repeal the tax on the circulation of state banks. Census Legislation. Carter of Montana reported from the census committee a bill conferring on the director of the census power to employ a purchasing agent.
