RIFLING OF A MAIL POUCH

Sack Cut Open and All Articles of Value Stolen.

YOUNG MAN ARRESTED ON SUSPICION

William M. Dryer of Logan Placed Behind the Bars Charged With the Rifling of a Mail Pouch and His Innocence.

William M. Dryer, a young man living at Logan, waived examination before United States Commissioner George F. Wright yesterday morning on the charge of rifling a mail pouch and abstracting its contents.

The mail pouch in question was stolen from the depot at Logan on Tuesday night. The department was notified an Inspector Ketchum detailed to work on the case, Wednesday morning Dryer called on the mayor of Logan and turned over to him a number of drafts and pension vouchers which had evidently been taken from the letters contained in the mail pouch.

Dryer when cross-questioned told a number of rambling stories. He said that on passing the depot Tuesday night he saw two men carrying a mail pouch from the depot to a house in the city.

Inspector Ketchum and Deputy Marshal McNaught made a search of the cemetery, and hidden back of a tombstone found the mail pouch. It had been hidden in a hole in the ground.

When seen at the jail yesterday Dryer still maintained that he had nothing to do with stealing the mailpouch and that he had found the papers near the Illinois Central depot.

Answer Filed in the Slack Peterson Injunction Suit.

SHAW TAKES THE OATH AGAIN

Sworn in a Second Time as Governor of the Great State of Iowa.

EXERCISES HELD IN THE AUDITORIUM

Five Thousand People Witness the Ceremonies-Governor Delivers His Inaugural and the Evening Reception.

DES MOINES, Jan. 11.—(Special Telegram)—Governor Leslie M. Shaw again took the oath of office. By his side and taking the same oath was Lieutenant Governor J. C. Millman. Never before in the history of the state have so many people had opportunity of witnessing the ceremonies.

The inauguration took place in the auditorium at 10 o'clock. The legislature met in joint session in the hour before the inauguration and joined the governor and lieutenant governor, supreme judges and other state officials, who had congregated in the executive parlors, and formed in line at the east entrance of the capitol building.

Shaw's Inaugural. In the course of his inaugural address Governor Shaw said: "Suppose we briefly take an invoice of what we have Iowa during several of recent years could have annually furnished Europe the product of Iowa mines of two and one-half tons of coal per capita."

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ABOLITION OF TRANSFER DEPT.

Special Council Committee Submits a Report on the Subject.

The special council committee consisting of Aldermen Shuler, Johnson and Brough, appointed to investigate the transfer department of the city, yesterday submitted a report.

The report of the committee is as follows: "We find, since the completion of the Union Pacific passenger depot in Omaha, certain railroads having their terminals in this city, are running their trains to and from there, receiving and delivering passengers contrary to the laws of the United States and the state of Iowa and in violation of the municipal ordinances granting them rights of way within our limits. This is in disregard of the rights of Council Bluffs as a terminal declared by state and national law.

Grand Jury Will Investigate. The attorney for John J. Deeming, charged by Miss Tina Leonard with betrayal under promise of marriage, notified Justice Vinton yesterday that he had called for further examination and would allow the case to be dealt with by the grand jury.
