TO IMPROVE THE NEGRO RACE

Prof. Booker T. Washington, Now in Omaha, Talks About His School in Tuskegee, Ala.

Booker T. Washington, principal of the Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute, accompanied by his secretary, W. O. Anderson, arrived in Omaha yesterday.

Prof. Washington will lecture in the First Congregational church next Monday evening.

He is now on his way to Denver and Colorado Springs, where he will speak this evening and Saturday night, returning to Omaha Sunday.

Prof. Washington is thoroughly devoted to his work of improving the condition of the southern negro and has taught faith in the efficacy of a liberal education as a means to this end.

"This institution is located in what is known as the Black Belt of Alabama," said the speaker, "and is the only one of its kind in the South.

The negroes outnumber the whites three to one. Nevertheless, this school is by no means local in its scope.

REV. MARTIN ACCEPTS A CALL

First Christian Church Will Have a Pastor After First of April.

After having been without a pastor since about August 1 last the congregation of the First Christian church has extended a call to Rev. Sumner T. Martin of Mason City, Ia., and the same has met with a prompt acceptance.

Rev. Martin has been pastor at Mason City for about four years, and prior to that time was evangelizing in Kansas for some time.

When he went to Mason City his congregation numbered about 250, and during his services there it has grown to over 900, the largest of that denomination in the state outside of the city of St. Moines.

Rev. Martin accepted an invitation to supply the pulpit of the First church January 7, the local congregation having invited him because of flattering information it had received of his Iowa work.

January 14 a call was extended him to come to Omaha, which he accepted immediately.

Those who met him here were very favorably impressed with him. He is said to be a strong pulpit worker, but his chief force is in his pastoral work.

He is about 38 years of age, of pleasant personality, and holds a B. S. degree from Bethany college, West Virginia. His family comprises his wife and four children.

The First church, to which he has been called, is in exceptionally fine condition for a down town church.

It is independent of the denomination and has a congregation of from 350 to 500.

So my father before he went away loaded the gun and told me to burn the dog good and plenty if he did it again. I didn't intend to kill him—just meant to scorch him a little, but I guess I shot too straight."

The case was continued until the return of the senior Close.

EVIL LIGHT ON SIMPLE DEED. Attempt Made to Give Advertising Circular Weight of a Dishonest Menace.

Since the charge of accepting bribes has been brought against George H. Hess, ex-member of the Board of Education, his friends have promised that they would file counter-charges against parties instigating the inquiry.

It is said that a complaint will be brought against H. J. Penfold, who is alleged to have given the public schools an advertising medium for defective sight.

It is said, the Aloc-Penfold company circulated a number of announcements among the school teachers. The pamphlets explained the grades and prices of oculists' goods, and cards were enclosed upon which the names of pupils with defective sight might be inscribed.

A test card with letters of different sizes was added to the other literature in order that any teacher might determine the visual powers of herself or those under her charge.

The communication contained the usual information sent to other patrons and neither by implication nor otherwise laid the least stress upon teacher or pupil.

It is the purpose of the friends of Mr. Hess to surround this simple circular with a sinister significance, the implication being that school teachers were forced to act as vendors for oculists' wares.
