ICE HARVEST OPENS BRISK

Dealers and Packing Houses Set Large Forces at Work with Modern Equipment.

The remarkably mild weather which prevailed until a few days ago set the ice men to guessing where they would get a crop and for a time it appeared that only the artificial product would be in use next summer. But now that the weather man has sent a polar wave water has frozen to such extent that the harvest is on. This weather, however, has not been sufficiently cold to make what is generally accepted as good ice. Eight inches is about the maximum thickness and that is on bodies of standing water. Swift and Company, Armour & Co. and Cudahy will begin work this morning with large forces of men and all the modern appliances for harvesting ice. Pumps and steam elevators will be used. Swifts have Cut Off Lake, Armours have an artificial lake of their own at Memphis, Neb., and Cudahys have Seymour lake. Nearly 1,000 men will be employed in the harvest. Work will be pushed night and day as long as the ice lasts, which according to weather indications may be only a short while. It costs more to harvest eight-inch ice than less three times as thick. This ice does not keep as easily as thick ice, but it is likely to be equally good as to quality.

CONNELL MAY ENJOIN YEISER

City Attorney Expresses Impatience with the Seventh Summons to Appear in Court.

City Attorney Connell, in behalf of the city, received formal notice yesterday for the seventh time that John O. Yeiser would bring mandamus proceedings to secure a place on the city ticket for the initiative and referendum. The hearing will occur on Tuesday before the supreme court. Mr. Connell expresses some impatience with Yeiser's refusal to accept no for an answer and points out that costs are accumulating that will either bankrupt Yeiser or prove a burden to the city. It is his opinion that after a series of defeats Yeiser should subside and he announces his intention of himself taking the initiative on the next occasion. He says that he will apply for an injunction to prevent such a multiplicity of litigation when no justifiable end is in sight.

UNION LABOR FOR MOORES

Local Branch of the American Federation Approves His Candidacy for Re-Election.

At a regular meeting of Federal union No. 8091, American Federation of Labor, Wednesday night, the candidacy of Frank E. Moores for mayor was endorsed in a resolution offered by H. S. Bell, unanimously adopted by the members present. The resolution was as follows: Whereas, The present mayor of the city of Omaha, the Hon. Frank E. Moores, has always shown himself, both in private life and as a public official, the consistent friend of the laboring people, and especially has he ever championed the cause of organized labor; therefore, be it Resolved, By Federal union No. 8091 of the American Federation of Labor, that we endorse the candidacy of the Hon. Frank E. Moores for re-election to the honorable position he has so acceptably filled for the last three years, and hereby pledge the unequalled support of this union to accomplish the desired end.

WEE MAIDEN TRAVELS ALONE

Laura Landon, Three and a Half Years Old, Comes from Maryland to Visit in Omaha.

A wee child alighted from the Burlington train yesterday. She was alone, but she was assisted to the platform by the porter, who evinced as much alacrity in his assistance and attention as though he were aiding a passenger to alight who had just tipped him handsomely. The child was a girl, 3 1/2 years, six months old. Her name is Laura Landon, and she had made the long trip from Hagerstown, Md., to Omaha, entirely alone. Her aunt, whom she had come such a long distance to visit, grasped her in her arms as soon as she alighted from the train, and the two were soon swallowed in the crowd that disappeared through the big doors of the Burlington station.

The diminutive passenger came from her home in Maryland over the Baltimore & Ohio railroad to Chicago, and thence to Omaha via the Burlington. Trainsmen on the latter road stated that they never had a more satisfactory passenger. The little girl enjoyed the novelty of the railroad journey immensely and went favor with all the passengers. Her charm of manner completely won the admiration of the porter and she lacked no possible attention from that source.

LEVY A PERPLEXING PROBLEM

Council is Engaged in Digesting the Various Claims as Presented in Mayor's Message.

The council met in special session yesterday to pass an appropriation ordinance including the following items: Library fund, \$628.80; park fund, \$95.29; road fund, \$202.80; fire fund, \$1,269; total, \$2,934.50. The payment of official salaries was necessarily referred until after the fixing of the new levy. The ordinance passed through three readings and was approved. The city comptroller reported a slight irregularity which had come to his notice in the employment of personal tax collectors. He said that the city treasurer had been authorized to employ two collectors, one at \$75 and one at \$100 per month. When the items were submitted to his inspection they amounted to \$47.50 in both cases. The matter was referred to the finance committee. After the council meeting the council discussed informally the new levy. It was the general opinion that the Board of Education had treated itself generously in demanding 4 mills and the editorial paragraph in The Herald was commented upon that similar increase in other departments would send the levy skyward. The city is confronted with the necessity of making up the \$159,000 judgment secured by the school board in the district court and feels that its demands are not marked with notable modesty. The problem of meeting the judgment is a difficult one, as the judgment fund can only be increased 1/2 mill under the constitution.

USE OFFENSIVE ENVELOPES

Postal Authorities Hold Up Mail of an Omaha Collecting Agency.

The Van Alstine, Cliff & Co.'s collection agency, with offices in the New York Life building, is in trouble with the United States postal authorities and mail sent out by this agency has been held up under instructions from the department at Washington. The trouble is in the sending of a return envelope, which is calculated to intimate that the person addressed is in debt and will not pay his bills. C. P. Searle, who is advertised as the manager of the company, was called before Postmaster Crow yesterday and told that no mail would be received for transmission in the offensive envelope. Searle denied any responsibility for the wording and said his principal had informed him that the form had been approved by the Post-office department and under these circumstances he did not think that he was breaking the postal laws. He was told that if the Omaha branch of the company persisted in using the envelope it would be the Omaha agent who would suffer, and he promised to discontinue its use.
