This sign is displayed on a building in a small Georgia town: "Teeth pulled cheap for cash. Also music taught on the piano. Coffins on the installment plan. Now is the time to bury your friends at a reasonable cost. We also dig graves."

John Brady, happening to see his name on a Long Island soldiers' monument, went indignantly to the authorities and said: "I think you may as well take my name off the soldiers' monument. I'm not dead, no, and I was not dead thirty-five years ago nor any other time." It did not seem to occur to him that there are other pebbles on the beach of glory.

It is proposed to change the civic charter of Vancouver, B. C., so that men whose wives own property may have two votes. This benevolent husband whose vote has always heretofore expressed his wife's opinion at the polls will now be able to nullify it by his own vote without fear of a family jar. What provision is to be made when all the property is in the wife's name—a device as popular in Vancouver as elsewhere—has not yet been considered.

The noble red man is to be represented at the Paris exposition after all, but not in his original war paint and whoops. The brass

band of the Carlisle Indian school, some sixty strong, will go to the French capital with their musical instruments and with a size club to sing college songs. There will also be an Indian maiden, who will play violin solos from the best composers. This while it may not be as picturesque as though Buffalo Bill had had the arranging of it, will undoubtedly furnish the French with a valuable object lesson as to the softening and refining influences of civilization.

The most prominent pig in the country is again in the public view, this time in a lawsuit. Sagana was purchased by Boatman Olat Olsen of the Olympia in Manila and immediately became the mascot of the admiral's flagship. Arrived in this country Olsen rented the pig for exhibition purposes to a Boston concern for \$25 a week, and Andrew Olsen, a boarding house keeper there, claiming that Olat had given him the animal, has collected \$50 from the exhibitors. Olat declares he never gave away the mascot and is suing for the money. Plaintiff and defendant are not related.

But few bystanders at the arrival of train No. 10 at the Erie station Wednesday, relate the Meadville (Pa.) Star, noticed that the pilot of the locomotive contained a passenger. Standing on the little step, a footboard, at the bottom of the cowcatcher

of a man, hatless and with his hair blowing in the wind. All the way from Greenville, twenty-six miles, he had occupied that position, where a loosening of his hold on an unusual job of the engine would have meant instant death. He had been stealing a ride on the train and was put off by the conductor when the train reached Greenville, losing his hat in the fray. He had just time to reach the front of the engine, where he correctly judged that no one would molest him. He stated that he was a railroad man by profession and had learned the business on the Erie road. When last seen he was inquiring the way to the railroad office, where he hoped to secure a job.

OUT OF THE ORDINARY.

McDoune celebrated New Year's day with a temperature of 114 in the shade. Three millions of people are said to be receiving famine relief in India and the government will spend in relief by the end of March \$75,000,000.

Switzerland makes a monopoly of the whiskey business and up to date it has \$1,000,000 on the right side of the ledger, with very little drinkeresses.

The emperor of Germany is collecting playing cards. He has samples of some of the earliest known and specimens from every country in the world where they are in common use.

The state of South Carolina has cleared up \$1,700,000 from its monopoly of the liquor business since the dispensary system was

established in 1892. Its earlier years it was the least profitable and the present year is expected to yield \$500,000.

Each battalion chief of the New York fire department is shortly to be supplied with a pocket telephone, which may be affixed to any fire box and will cheerfully be the operator to talk directly with headquarters. The attachment is simple and the device may be carried in an inside pocket.

Benjamin White, a broker of San Francisco, owns what he claims to be the stub of the pencil which Lincoln received his Gettysburg speech on an envelope aboard the train bearing him to the battlefield. The pencil was borrowed from and later returned to Mr. White's father, who was with the presidential party.

A company delivering milk in New York offers \$50 to be distributed to the ten drivers who return the greatest number of bottles during this year. These bottles cost the company about 5 cents each, and thousands of them are retained by customers. It is said, as depositories for jam and similar delicacies.

The Kaiser, it is said, takes a great delight in seeing very big men in uniform. It is in the blood. Frederick the Great, when he had need of promoting his irascible old father, used to make him a present of a 6 foot 4 inch or 5 foot 5 inch grenadier. That satisfied the heart of Frederick William.

The soldiers of the Pitch Home for Soldiers and Sailors' Naval Committee, have presented a unique case to Governor George L. Rounseville. It is of natural logwood, and upon it are carved likenesses of the governor and Admiral Dewey, the commander of the Maine, the state arms and the

state capitol, and representatives of marines, cavalrymen, infantrymen, flags and cannon. All the work was done with a jackknife and file.

Measured by bulk, American literature is prospering. The Publishers' Weekly records the number of books issued in the United States last year at 4,745, besides 52 new editions, an increase of 417 over the output of 1898. Of the total of 5,262, including new editions, 4,826 were books by American authors, and 37 were books by foreign authors manufactured in the United States. One thousand one hundred and twenty-four were books by English authors imported here or in sheets.

The suspension bridge that is to connect New York with Hudson will be the longest of its kind, having a span of 2,700 feet. It is estimated that the bridge, with its approaches, will cost \$20,000,000 and it will not be met by John D. Rockefeller or Andrew Carnegie either, but by the plain people. Probably the bridge will be double-decked and provided with a carriage road, a footpath, a bicycle path and four trolley car tracks on the upper deck, beside the six tracks for regular steam railroad, freight and passenger trains on the main deck.

THE OLD-TIMERS.

Nicholas Kuhn, who celebrated his 90th birthday last Wednesday, is the oldest living citizen of Chicago, where he has lived since 1832.

Mrs. Mary Bryan Cook, great-grandmother of William J. Bryan, is living near Kokomo, Ind., at the age of 98, and is in

excellent health. Her first husband, Louis Bryan, the ancestor of the democratic leader, was a soldier in the war of 1812 and in the Mexican war.

Abraham E. Elmer of Utica, said to be the oldest inhabitant of New York state, has just celebrated his 113th birthday. He was born in Warren, Herkimer county, and lost his eyesight fourteen years ago, but otherwise is well preserved. He has lived so long since he was 10 years old.

William Earl Cook, believed to be the oldest living free Mason, observed the 104th anniversary of his birth the other day at his home in Portsmouth, N. H. At other birthday celebrations of Mr. Cook five generations of the family were present, but as his health has been failing the usual large party was not invited. Mr. Cook was born in Portsmouth January 26, 1797.

Prof. William Porter, dean of Bobol (W.V.) college, reached his 80th birthday on the 10th and has been a remarkable celebration over the event. The usual chapel exercises were on that day converted into a praise service celebrating the work of Rev. Dr. Porter during the forty-seven years of his connection with the institution. Prof. Porter has been connected with the Wisconsin college since 1852.

William Kerr of Providence, R. I., is still pursuing the trade of watchmaking at the age of 82 years, after sixty-six years' work at it. The Jewellers' Circular says he has invented several curious clocks. The best known being one on which a little ball makes a zigzag journey down an inclined plane which fills back and forth at regular intervals. In 1879 he made a large working model of the Strasbourg Cathedral clock.
