TIME OF THROUGH TRAINS

Schedule for New Transcontinental Trains Soon to Be Instituted.

General Passenger Agent Francis of the Burlington has returned from San Francisco, where he was in attendance upon a conference of officials of the Burlington, Rock Island, Denver & Rio Grande, Rio Grande Western and Southern Pacific, relative to a new through train service between Chicago and San Francisco.

Mr. Francis substantiated the reports which came from San Francisco by wire after the conclusion of the meeting as published in the Bee. "As a result of this conference," said Mr. Francis, "there will be added after February 23 two new through lines to the coast from Chicago, via either the Burlington or the Rock Island to Denver, thence to Ogden over the Rio Grande routes and from there to San Francisco over the Southern Pacific. Our Northern Pacific Limited, will run on its present time, except that the time of its connection with the Southern Pacific at Ogden will be changed. The time of departure from Ogden will be 10:15 a. m., instead of 12:30 p. m., and San Francisco will be reached at 10 p. m., instead of 8:50 p. m.

The Rock Island will have a new schedule for its transcontinental train almost identical with the Burlington's. Westbound the train will leave Chicago at 10 p. m., pass through Omaha at 5:55 p. m. and reach San Francisco at 5:50 in the afternoon of the third day. Eastbound the Rock Island will leave San Francisco at 8:30 a. m., pass through Omaha at 11 p. m. and reach Chicago at 7:54 in the morning of the fourth day.

New Electric Road in Iowa. C. M. Stanley, Ia., the city negotiating with the Commercial club and others for the construction of an electric railroad with a southern terminus at Hamburg, Ia., connecting the thriving towns of the southwestern part of the state now said to be at the mercy of the Burlington. The proposed road will run from Hamburg through Tabor, Sidney, Glenwood and probably to Silver City, the eventual intention being to connect it with Council Bluffs and Omaha.
