VERDICT IN GREGORY CASE

Jury Finally Agrees to Compromise After Being Out Two Days.

ASSAULT COMMIT GREAT BODILY INJURY

One Year in Jail Heaviest Sentence That Can Be Inflicted for Shooting Constable Moss-Talk of Jury Retiring.

J. A. Gregory, the desperado and horse thief, who has already served three terms in the penitentiary and who shot and narrowly escaped killing Constable Hardin Moss of Loveland, will not be called upon to explain the crime by a severer penalty than one year in the county jail. The jury before which he was tried on this charge in the district court, after being out nearly two days, arrived at a compromise verdict yesterday afternoon, finding him guilty only of assault with intent to commit murder.

DRAMATIC SCENE IN COURT.

Prisoner Satisfies Court that His Sentence is Well Deserved.

DES MOINES, Feb. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—There was a dramatic scene in district court this morning when Frank Belding was arraigned to be sentenced for highway robbery. Judge Scott of Brooklyn presiding. The limit is twenty years and the judge pronounced that as Belding's sentence.

The jury brought in a verdict of guilty and charged after being out for an hour, but recommended him to the mercy of the court. Paul, who claims to be from Creston, Ia., admitted stealing the overcoat, but denied breaking into the car. He said the car was open and he entered with the intention of securing a pair of pants.

Young Elopers Arrested at York to Await Arrival of Irate Parent.

FORT DODGE, Ia., Feb. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—The country in the vicinity of Farnhamville, Ia., a small town twenty miles northwest of this city, is excited by an elopement. James McDonald, a farmhand, wedded and won pretty Rose McLain, the daughter of A. B. McLain, a prominent and wealthy farmer. McDonald is a comparatively recent arrival and nothing is known concerning his antecedents.

GENERAL WESTERN NEWS.

BOONE, Ia., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Luther Davidson, on trial in the district court for shooting Alfred Thelin during the mining troubles last summer, changed his plea of not guilty to guilty of assault with intent to commit manslaughter. He was sentenced by Judge Weaver to four months in the county jail. He has already been in jail five months. Thelin has recovered, although the wound was supposed to be fatal.

Mining in Cody. CODY, Wyo., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Work on the Gold Reef property near Colonel Pickett's ranch on Four Bear is to be resumed this spring by a company of Chicago capitalists who own the property. It is the intention to push development work until the ledge is struck, when reduction works will be erected. Several experts have reported upon the Gold Reef and say that it is one of the largest and best free milling gold propositions in the state.

Family Skeletons Unearthed. PIERRE, S. D., Feb. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—Last fall several buildings belonging to A. E. Rich, a Cheyenne river ranchman, were burned and at the time incendiaries were hinted, but nothing was done. A few days ago Rich's wife secured a divorce from him and he has now secured the arrest of Mrs. Raymond Herbert, sister of his former wife, on a charge of burning the buildings and also the arrest of Narcisse Nacelle, his former brother-in-law, on a charge of shooting with intent to kill. The cases, if pushed, will develop a lot of past family trouble, out of which they both grew.

Gamble Will Not Try for Senate. DEADWOOD, S. D., Feb. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—George A. Silsby of Mitchell, national bank examiner for South Dakota, is in Deadwood tonight. He has but recently returned from Washington, D. C., where he met Congressman Gamble of South Dakota, confidentially. Mr. Gamble told Mr. Silsby that he did not propose to give up a sure thing by throwing over a renomination for congress in an endeavor to get to the senate, of which he would not be certain.

Preparations for Mining. CHEYENNE, Wyo., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Agents are here purchasing heavy draft horses for different mining companies in the Grand Encampment country. The animals will be used in transporting the ore from the mines to the railroad. There is a great demand for freighters and freight teams in southern Carbon county and many hundreds of horses will be required to meet the demands of the mining men during the coming summer, or until a railroad is built to the district.

Mining Man Inmate. CHEYENNE, Wyo., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Mark Bernouy, a prominent mining man of the Hahn's Peak country, near the Wyoming-Colorado line south of Laramie, has been adjudged insane. The cause of his delirium was over-excitement incident to the discovery of rich mineral in his mines. This is the second mining man who has gone crazy in the Hahn's Peak district during the present year over the unexpected discovery of rich ore.

Soldier's Funeral in South Dakota. RAPID CITY, S. D., Feb. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—Sergeant Will Smith was buried today in the cemetery in this city. He was a member of Company M and was killed in battle in the Philippines. His body arrived today and the funeral services occurred this afternoon. Chaplain Dailey officiated, and the most touching service ever held in the city. Members of Black Hills companies, comrades of the deceased, were in attendance.

Believe They Have Burglars. MITCHELL, S. D., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Two men were arrested yesterday charged with stealing an overcoat and several articles and were bound over to the district court. The men were strangers and when searched a fine kit of burglar tools and a search in their possession. It is believed that they were in the city for some time.

Cornmakers Win a Strike. CLEVELAND, Feb. 9.—The cornmakers' strike, which was inaugurated at a number of counties in this city several weeks ago, has terminated in a victory for the strikers. They will get \$2.50 per day, time and one-half for overtime and double pay for work on Sundays and holidays.

Post of Kansas Mail Found. SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—The body of Byron H. Harpman, cousin of Mrs. J. K. Miller of Oakland, better known in the literary world as Florence Harpman Miller, has been washed ashore on Angel Island in the Bay of San Francisco. Whether death was caused by suicide or accident is unknown. Harpman's home was in Oswego, Kan., where his mother and one of his sisters reside.

War Against Slot Machines. SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—The authorities of Estelline are waging a war against nickel-in-the-slot machines. One man who was arrested for operating one of the machines pleaded guilty to the charge of running the machine for gambling purposes and was assessed the sum of \$26.75.
