Men Who Are Qualified to Conduct Such Project Successfully So Declare.

SEEKING A LOCATION IN KOUNTZE PARK

Board of Directors of Omaha Auditorium Association Hold Enthusiastic Meeting and Appoint Necessary Committees.

If the character and standing of the men who are manifesting an interest in the roject and the enthusiasm with which they have taken hold of it anew is any measure of its prospects of success Omaha is destined to soon add an auditorium to its many metropolitan advantages. At a called meeting of the board of directors of the Omaha Auditorium association at the rooms of the Commercial club there was practically a full attendance and considerable time was spent in an enthusiastic discussion of the project, the result of which was that committees were appointed looking to the carrying into effect of the purposes of the association,

which was incorporated some time ago. It was decided that a most desirable locaion would be Kountze park, a tract of elevan scres lying between Ninetcenth and Twentyfirst streets, in the very center of the Grand Court of Honor of the exposition. This tract has been set apart as a public park and as soon as means are available will be beautified as such by the Board of Park Commissioners. If permission can be secured to locate an auditorium thereon it is the intention of the auditorium association to expend something like \$30,000 in the erection of such a building at the same time that the work of parking the tract is under-

the Board of Park Commissioners with a and cannot fail to cure. view of obtaining such permission. This property was given to the city by Mr. Kountze upon condition that it be made a public park and beautified as such, but it is thought that the donor would not object to the building of an auditorium upon one end of it, especially when such a structure need not interfere with the general plan of the park and can be made to augment rather than curtail the benefit of such a park to he public. Another committee, comprising Mesers, R

Jordan, J. H. Evans and Harry Lawrie was appointed to investigate and report upor he plans and cost of a suitable building. Among the men who appear to be maniesting the deepest interest in this project are C. H. Pickens, chairman of the executive committee of the Commercial club: C F Weller, J. H. Evans of the park commission A. P. Tukey and R. C. Jordan. Speaking of the project Mr. Pickens said:

"I have favored such an enterprise fo some years, but it has been thought best during the two years just closed not to push it. Of course it could not have been successfully done during the Transmississipp exposition year, as Omaha people had abou to, and the recurrence of the exposition with its unsatisfactory financial results made it impossible to talk Auditorium last year. There is no good reason why the enterprise should not now be pushed to successful conclusion. I think the location now under discussion an extremely advantageous one, if it on he secured. When Kountze park is improved by the park commission it will be a model location. The evening attendance at the exposition has demonstrated that it is not so far out that t would not be easily accessible with the street railway facilities it possesses."

Atttention has been called to the fact that in many cities that possess Auditorium buildings they are located away from the Thon Dirt business centers. The Kansas City Auditorum is said to be fully as far away from the center of travel and traffic as the proposed Omaha location, while the Chicago building that did service as an Auditorium. was located away out at the old World's Fair grounds.
