

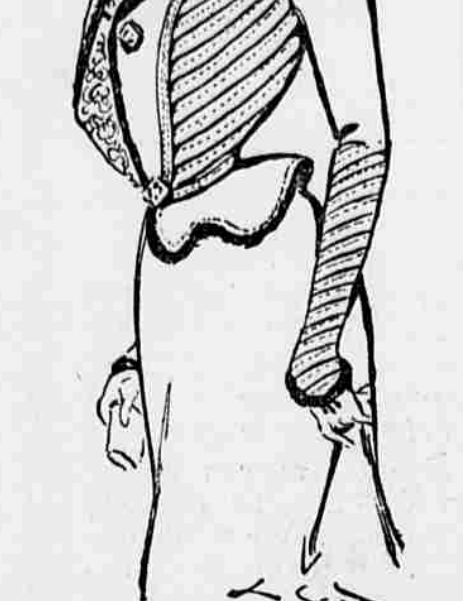
IN THE DOMAIN OF WOMAN.
