Cattle receipts 2,783 head—A jet propelled demand sent prices soaring into outer space to John Sputnik No. 2 for new altitude records. New highs for both heifer calves and all classes of steers were the order of the day, with nearly 1,000 head of Charley Peterson's "Matadors" steers selling at \$24.20 to \$26.00 cwt. weighing from 575 to 775 lbs. average. Heavier feeders weighing 80 to 900 lbs. sold at \$22.85 to \$25.50. A long string of choice feeder heifers sold from \$22.25 to \$24.50 at weights of 550 to 700 lbs. average. Heifer calves were in strong demand at \$23.90 to \$25.50 cwt. Steer calves sold strong, but not as sharply higher as other classes in a range of \$25.50 to \$29.00 cwt. All classes of cows and butcher cattle sold 50 cents higher.
