Fundy's Tides Are Mighty

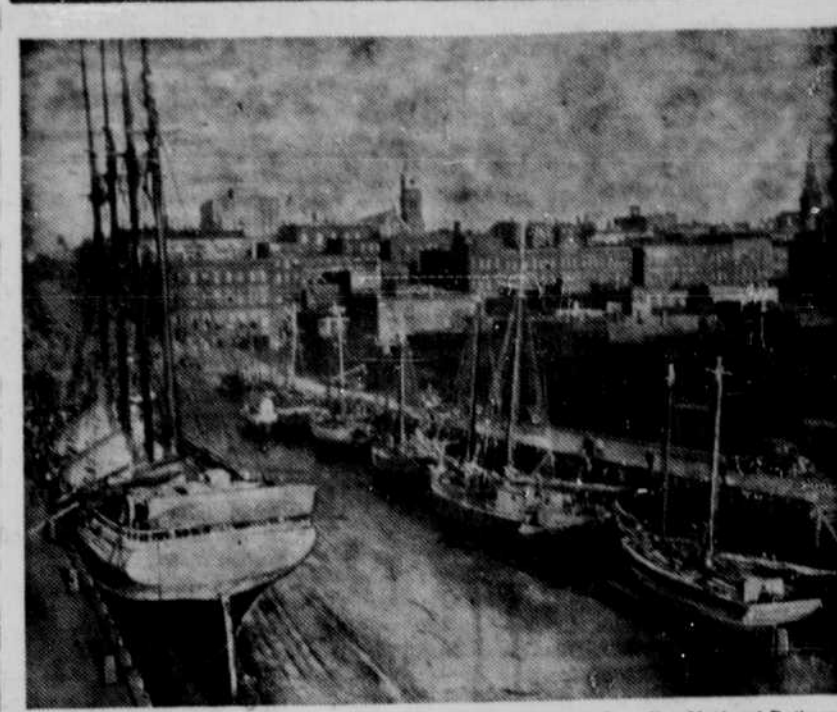

HIGH AND DRY are these ships in Market Slip at Saint John's, New Brunswick, Canada, when the mighty Fundy tide is out. One hundred billion tons of salt water surges through the rocky portals of the Bay of Fundy every 12 hours and 25 minutes, affecting the Bay ports of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. One of the most startling sights along the coast is ships high and dry in the morning and afloat 12 hours later. Normal tide in the Bay of Fundy is about 40 feet; the highest in the world and the mightiest manifestation of the moon's strange pull on the oceans. PHG
